

### SCHOOL ATHLETICS SHOW BIG PROFIT

Football Nets Athletic Association Nearly \$1,000, Report Indicates

The end of the football season finds the \$888.03 in the athletic fund, the largest amount ever on hand at this time, according to Louis Randall, business manager of the Birmingham public schools. The report was given at the meeting of the school board Monday evening in the Baldwin High School.

The total receipts amounted to \$1,486.16, but \$597.23 were paid out for supplies and services. The largest part of this total was from the Birmingham Boys' Oak football game on Thanksgiving Day at Royal Oak, when \$500.00 was taken in. The Fulton game was next, with \$112. The balance on hand at the beginning of the season, Oct. 15, was \$346.41.

To Oversee Distribution of Christmas Baskets Among Families

A new system will be employed by the Community House in its welfare work this Christmas when baskets will be delivered by the contributors themselves to families whose names will be provided by the House, according to Miss Mary Clarke Griffith, hostess.

An increase in the number of unemployed causes the burden of welfare work to loom large on the horizon this year, and Miss Griffith, who is also chairman of the village relief committee, has decided to ask each organization which has a civic or welfare committee, and any individual who cares to send in his name, to carry Christmas cheer to one family whose name she will furnish. Teas, candy for the children and food for Christmas dinner and some days to come will be contained in the baskets.

Heretofore contributions have been brought to the Community House and distributed from there. "There is no reason why the baskets should come there first," Miss Griffith said, "and I think it would save time and transportation if we just supplied the names to the donors, and let them deliver directly."

This system was employed at Thanksgiving time, with considerable success, she said. "That doesn't mean that we won't be accepting contributions at the House," Miss Griffith explained, "we will, lots of them, and we will distribute them, but we feel that we will be able to get more done if we follow this plan."

### TAX BILLS READY FOR MAILED DEC. 10

Township To Raise More Than \$1,000,000 In Assessments This Year

Approximately \$1,000,000 will be raised through taxes in the township this year. The increase is due to improvements in the township. Despite the increased amount of money to be raised the tax rate is but one cent higher than last year. The rate was set during the fall session of the board of supervisors at \$30.10.

eral chairman of the Public Interests association, and members of that organization. Formed soon after the presentation of the petition Nov. 4 and composed of a group of business and professional men and women as well as citizens in private life, the organization has done little since but work for the defeat of the recall.

A group of women worked all today at the Community House under instructions of Birmingham and their efforts in keeping track of the voters and personally calling those who were remiss in getting to the polls were probably the most efficient in any campaign here.

A complete card index to all voters was before them. They also had representatives at every election booth who knew the persons and checked them off the list as they made their appearance at the polls. Hourly reports were checked against the ones in the index.

These women knew at all times through the day who had voted and who had not voted. Automobiles were sent after those who could not get to the polls without them. Reports that the alleged illegality of the election would be sufficient grounds for another election were called erroneous today by attorneys. They pointed out that the only conflict in the election was between the village charter and the state law and said that the procedure followed the village charter.

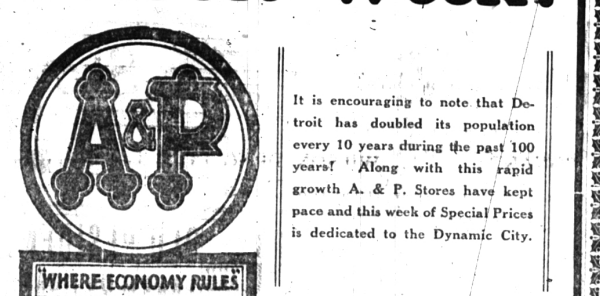
