Everyone here knows that, in the near future, the village commission intends to sell the present site of the Baldwin Public Library, which houses practically every village enterprise, including the dog pound and water meters. The village commission recently turned over to the library board a block of land upon which, it is hoped, a decent public library will be erected. As far as we have been able to learn, such a library could take concrete form whenever the library board copipletes its plans.

We have heard that it will be about a year before such plans are ready, after which the matter of raising sufficient funds must be submitted to the people for approval. What we can't understand is just why it requires an entire year to get together plans for a building that will cost much less than a building that our school board prepares—in some cases—in a few weeks.

Certainly, enough time ought to be spent in planning a library for Birmingham's future needs. Perhaps it does require a year to folan a building that costs about \$150,000.00; if it does, then it ought to take about two years to get out plans for a school building that costs a quarter of a million dollars or more.
