CO. SHOWS MUCH PROGRESS ON ROADS BUILT DURING 1925

Paving of Woodward Said To Have Exceeded Anything In World's History

MORE CONCRETE ROADS

Road Commission Expects To Lay Many New Pavements This Year

Paving of Woodward avenue to an extent unequalled by any other suburban highway in the country; laying of many more miles of pavement throughout the county and the maintenance of county roads at the record of the Oakland County road commissioners and engineers for 1925, according to a statement published in the Pontiac Daily Press.

The greater portion of Woodward avenue, which approximates 13.4 miles of 40 foot pavement, is already laid, more than 16 miles of this since the past spring. There remains but 2.4 miles of the 20 foot strip to be laid prior to the moving of the Grand Trunk tracks which swing onto the east 40 foot strip one mile north of Birmingham and continue south of that village to the Eleven Mile road, a distance of about 6 miles.

To Move D. U. R. Tracks
The highway will be completed, except for the above named portion, during the coming summer, according to Leon V. Belknap, county engineer. Agreeing the work, the D. U. R. tracks on the west of the east 40 foot strip between Pontiac and the Stinchfield Hill will also be moved. This work is expected to be done in the spring since the agreement has been reached.

When completed the highway will have a right-of-way 200 feet wide with paved one way traffic routes, each 40 feet wide, on either side of the D. U. R. tracks. These will replace a pavement which was in no place as wide as either of the two new paved ways.

West Half About Complete
Pavement laid to date includes the full 40 foot road on the west half from Pontiac to Detroit, excepting in the village of Birmingham and two small gaps between here and the northern limits of that village. On each side the 40 foot pavement is complete between the Right and Eleven Mile roads and two more 40 foot strips north of Birmingham are complete. Twenty foot pavement is complete on the east side except for two gaps north of Birmingham which amount to about 700 feet.

Uniform lights and traffic signals have been installed along the highway when the committee selected for different municipalities along Woodward avenue submits its plans to Gov. Alex. J. Graybeek.

Other County Pavements
Pavement laid on other county roads during the year approximates 18 miles of 20 foot cement and concrete. Seven miles have been laid on the Clewson road and a mile and one of the six on the East Long Lake road have been constructed. Five miles on east Maple road, one out of three on the Ten Mile road and one of the other cement and concrete roads built during the year.

The maintenance department has been reorganized and equipped with added machinery and buildings. One garage at Davsburg has been built and one at Orion and one at Highland are in the process of construction while a complete system of road markers has been ordered.

Plans For Next Year
Plans for 1926 include, aside from the completion of Woodward avenue, highway, five miles of 20 foot pavement on the Stevenson super-Monier road, seven miles on the Twelve Mile road, three and one-half miles on the Orchard Lake road; two and one-half miles of 16 foot gravel on the Dublin road, two and one-half miles on the east side of White Lake and four and one-half miles on the Bushman road.

It is expected that other road proposals will be submitted to the Board of County Supervisors when it meets next week.
