"ALOMA OF THE SOUTH SEAS" ON LAST WEEK AT GARRICK

"Aloma of the South Seas," that colorful melodrama at the Garrick Theatre, ends its fourth and last week on Saturday, Jan. 16th. This melodrama, depicted in atmosphere and local color of the South Seas, has been remarkably successful here. It has played to capacity houses at every performance.

This tale of a white derelict, suffering from the after-effects of the world war and a busted love affair of his own, makes intensely interesting drama. It's the native girl and her native suitor who are the backbone of the play. The latter, a sinister individual with a penchant for feeding white men to the sharks, is a strong and dominating role well acted by John A. Lorenz. The Aloma of Marguerite Riser is a dainty creation and this young actress plays her part so well that one can't help thinking that she will go far in her chosen profession of an actress.

From the moment of her scheming to become the white man's hut-

keeper, she is attracted to him because he beats off a beastly bootlegging skipper who is trying to kiss her—until she realizes that she has been beaten in the game of love by a white woman, Aloma, as she is played by Miss Riser, gives way to many emotions. She is first the savage co-

quette, then the fighting woman, lying and vehement in making known publicly her love for the white man. And in the end when he goes off with the white woman he really loves, the savage maiden is a pathetic little figure as she agrees to marry her native lover.
