SECOND HEARING ON OKLAHOMA AVE.

206—Moved by President Shan that the following preamble and resolution be adopted:

Whereas the second resolution passed by this Commission on the paving and paving of Oklahoma Avenue on the 18th day of May 1926, provided for a 36 foot pavement and

Whereas the Commission and residents deem it for the best interests of all concerned to reduce the width of the pavement to 32 feet and 12 feet and 12 feet on the Trunk Roadway and 30 feet west of the same.

Now, therefore be it resolved that the second and third resolutions passed by this Commission on the paving and paving of Oklahoma Avenue be amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That the Commission be and it is the duty of the Commission to cause to be laid and maintained a 32 foot pavement on Oklahoma Avenue between East Maple Avenue and East Grand Avenue, and 30 feet west of the same.

Whereof notice of the meeting has been given in the manner required by law to each person owning property liable for special assessment within a specified time, and the Commission has on the 18th day of June, A. D. 1926 at 8 o'clock P. M. and purpose aforesaid, and the hearing has been given to all persons making suggestions and objections to the proposed pavement, therefore

Be it resolved that curb and gutter and repaving with Tarvia treatment, 14 ft. wide between curbs and constructed on East Maple Avenue between East Grand Avenue and East Grand Avenue in the Village of Birmingham, and further resolved that all lots and parcels of land fronting and abutting on each side of Parkside Avenue within the district heretofore described be constituted into the lots of 10,000 sq. ft. each, which shall be levied and spread according to the plan of the proposed improvement, and the cost of the improvement according to the plan of the proposed improvement, by the City Manager and now on file with the City Clerk.

Be it further resolved that the Village of Birmingham shall pay from the general fund the amount of \$12,000.00, the least of the improvement, and

Be it further resolved that the Assessor of the Village of Birmingham be hereby directed, in pursuance hereof, to make a special assessment according to benefits as herein provided on all taxable lands within the Village of Birmingham, which shall be levied and spread according to the plan of the proposed improvement, and impart the same to this Office, and the same to be levied and spread on the 1st day of September, 1926.
