

Pageant Will Aid Building Program

A skillful and striking combination of the supreme achievements in spectacle, pageantry and drama will be shown in the pageant of "1776" which will be presented July 2-10 by the University of Detroit Alumni Association at the University of Detroit Stadium, Detroit, Livernois avenue at Six Mile road.

This stirring allegorical presentation will dramatize vividly the continuance of true Americanism. The patriotic exhibition is the greatest historical masterpiece ever presented in pageant form and will be given in glowing jets of fire with 1000 people taking part, 15 acts interspersed throughout the intermission and 400-000 being exploded in fireworks.

Commemorative Event The pageant of "1776" will be given in commemoration of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. While this is being generally observed throughout the country, the University of Detroit will especially celebrate the event by the showing of "1776" which is equipped by the weather production of its kind in the country.

Every incident which forms the story of "1776" is historically accurate. The first episode of this spectacle will show a realistic production of historic old Boston under the rule of the British army with the colorful and costly patrolling the notoriously narrow streets, with historical structures such as Old North Church, Green Dragon Tavern and Faneuil Hall rising above the jumbled houses, picturing events as they were when the "Boston Tea Party" occurred.

The next scene shows the "Tea Party" fleet in full swing. The prow of the old ship, "Dartmouth," will be seen tied up to Griffith's wharf where it lay when this historic and far-reaching incident took place. More than a score of patriots, dressed as redcoats, will be seen slipping open the tea and pouring it into the harbor while their fellow patriots look on and cheer.

With similar vividness other events of Revolutionary days, through the signing of the Declaration of Independence and culminating in the battle of Yorktown will be presented. This climax will be a realistic battle in which hundreds of specially trained troops representing the English, French and Americans, will take part and the serech of shot and shell, destruction by gunnery, and the blinding glare of hundreds of rockets

illuminating the night sky with their terrific splendor.

This great historical drama and patriotic spectacle will be presented against a background which is unique in the history of outdoor entertainment. It is the largest historical oil painting in the world, over 500 feet long and over 50 feet high. On this are reproduced with historical accuracy many of the settings before which the stirring events take place.
