NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the ensuing Annual Township Election will be held at the three regular voting Precincts within said Township, on Monday, April 5, 1926, for the purpose of voting for the election of the following offices and positions: One Township Clerk, One Township Treasurer, One Highway Commissioner, One Justice of the Peace full term, One Justice of the Peace to fill vacancy, One Member of the Board of Review, Four Constables.
