Seen And Heard In Our Schools

At School Cafeteria
Pupils and teachers who eat their lunches in the high school cafeteria have a wide range of foods from which to choose. Recently were noted on the counter six kinds of desert, not including several different pies, five kinds of salad, rolls, and three different breads. The meats and vegetables were kept hot in porcelain containers.

Asked why there was so much pie and whether it could hold its own against ice cream, Mrs. Kinney who is in charge of the kitchen, assisted by one girl, said: "Pie is the most popular desert we have. The only reason I can figure out is that the children aren't allowed to eat it at home at night so they ask for it here. Our vanilla and chocolate ice cream can't compare with pie in popularity." We remarked that a good many pupils ate in the various lunch rooms in the village. "We aren't allowed to serve coffee or candy," said Mrs. Kinney, "and I think that partially explains why they go up town. Of course, we aren't as busy during the warm weather because many of the children go home at noon then. A lot of the Hill School pupils come here for lunch."

The cafeteria holds 14 tables, each of which seats eight, and they are usually all occupied, according to Mrs. Kinney. The teachers have their own dining room which has two long tables. Preparations begin at eight o'clock in the morning and the two women work till four. Mrs. Kinney does all her shopping in the morning, for she says that it takes practically the whole afternoon to clean up.
