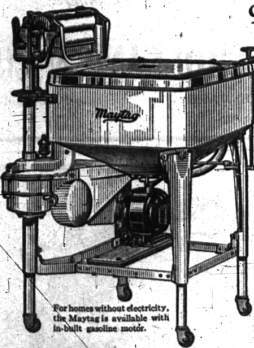

VACATING STREETS
187—Moved by President Street the following resolution be adopted: Whereas, Mrs. Mary Ann Jarvis, husband and wife of Birmingham, Michigan, conveyed by Warranty Deed dated November 4, 1893, recorded in Liber 175 of Deeds, Page 384, the following described property to be used for street "Jarvis Street" in the said street, being described as follows:

Commencing in the center of the Southfield road at the Northwest corner of land owned by Robert Hanna, Inc., thence easterly along the north line of said Hanna's land two hundred and thirty feet to a line parallel westerly fifty (50) feet thence westerly and on a line parallel with the first mentioned line to a center of the Southfield road, thence southerly to the "Jarvis Street" in the said land to be used for street purposes only and to be known as "Jarvis Street" in the said Village.

Whereas, by virtue of title plat of A. E. Peters Sub-division on Southfield Avenue, and recorded in the Register of Deeds Office, Oakland County, Michigan, in Liber 18 of plats, page 17, provision is made for a street 50 feet wide through said property mentioned in said title plat, and

Whereas, by virtue of said street being located on said E. Peters plat, it is no longer necessary to use the property above described as a street.

Now therefore it is resolved, that the street described in the foregoing recitals as a street, or alley, and that the same be

It is further resolved that the 7th day of June, 1926, shall be the time specified in the above recitals for the vacation of said street, and that the minutes of each meeting as published in the Birmingham Record to the date hereof, shall be read and approved by the Board.
