TWO VILLAGERS ARE RE-ELECTED COUNTY RED CROSS HEADS

Mrs. T. R. Donovan and Chas. J. Shain To Continue On Board Another Year

ANNUAL REPORT IS GIVEN

Mrs. T. R. Donovan and Charles J. Shain were re-elected directors of the Oakland County chapter of the American Red Cross at the annual meeting held recently. The report of the home service section of this chapter for the year ending Sept. 30, 1926, was also read, showing a total of 1,993 calls made by the section. This included 796 calls to the office, 608 telephone calls both from and to the office, and 589 calls made to homes in the interest of the various cases. There have been 207 cases in charge, which is a decrease of 61 cases over the previous year.

While the number of office calls has decreased, the work required on each case is more difficult and more home visits are necessary, which visits require considerable time as some of them are in remote parts of the county. The U. S. Veterans Bureau very often asks that home visits be made relative to present and mental condition of some of the ex-service men and also that a number of calls be made in the interest of having guardians appointed for minors. Some investigations are also made for the government, requests usually coming through Red Cross field directors, when men in service ask to be discharged.

During the current year, \$1,235.52 was expended for the relief of disabled ex-service men and their families throughout the county, but \$214.23 was reimbursed us on loans. A great many applications for adjusted compensation, or federal bonus, have been filed, as well as applications for dependents' federal bonus. However, case records are not made on these applications, excepting where there is some problem that will need further attention. Applications for the federal bonus must be filed on or before Jan. 1, 1928, so every veteran, who has not filed application, is urged to do so before that date. The adjusted compensation is in the form of a 20 year endowment policy so it is to the advantage of the veterans to make application at once. A great deal of assistance has been rendered during the year in obtaining reimbursement from U. S. Veterans bureau of \$100 on funeral ex-

penses, which is allowed for veterans who served in any war since 1897. It is understood that there are 550 patients in the U. S. Veterans Hospital, Camp Center, for nervous and mental patients. This number is greater than it was planned to hospitalize there, so it is impossible to procure treatment there at the present time for any ex-service man if his mental or nervous disability is not due to service. The regulation reads that treatment will only be given when the government has facilities in hospitals for caring for veterans whose disabilities are not service connected. A large box of used clothing was sent to the Red Cross Service in U. S. Veterans Hospital at Camp Center last fall. Some non-commissioned patients were not clothed warmly but the government has now passed a ruling that will take care of this situation. Some assistance has also been given relative to procuring dependent's compensation for parents and minors.

REGISTRATION NOTICE

Saturday, Nov. 27, 1926

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that in conformity with Act 126, Public Acts of 1917, I, the undersigned Village Clerk, will upon any day except Sunday and a legal holiday, or the day of any regular or special election or official primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Village not already registered, who may apply to me personally for such registration, except that I can receive no names for registration on the day of the meeting of the Board of Registration.

Notice is further hereby given that the Board of Registration for Precinct 1, will meet at the Voting Booth at the corner of Harmon Avenue and North Woodward Avenue, and the Board for Precinct 2 will meet in the Commission Room in the Village Hall, corner Martin and Pierce Streets, and the Board for Precinct 3 will meet at Voting Booth, S. W. corner of Lincoln and So. Woodward, on Saturday, November 27, 1926, from 7:00 o'clock A. M. to 8:30 o'clock P. M. (Central Standard Time) of said day for the purpose of completing the list of qualified electors of said Village.

Precinct 1, is all that territory North of the Center Line of Maple Avenue.

Precinct 2, is all that territory South of the Center Line of Maple Avenue and North of the Center Line of Lincoln Avenue.

Precinct 3, is all that territory South of the Center Line of Lincoln Avenue.

The name of no person but an actual resident of said Village at the time of registration, and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote on the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH

If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, and shall UNDER OATH, state that he or she is a resident of said Village TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he or she possesses other qualifications of an elector under the Constitution; and that owing to sickness or bodily infirmity of himself, or some other member of his family, or owing to his absence from the Village on public business or his own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registration of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he shall then be permitted to vote at such election. If such applicant shall, in said matter, willfully make any false statement, he shall be deemed guilty of perjury and, upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.

WOMEN ELECTORS

The names of all qualified women electors not already appearing on the registration list will be registered provided personal Application is made in conformity with the foregoing provisions.
