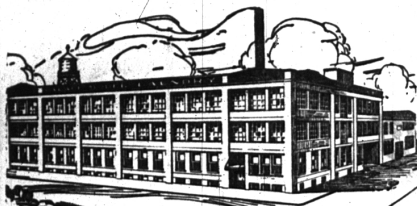

Announcement by the management of the Cas, Detroit's new downtown legitimate playhouse, that "The Vagabond King," current offering at that theater, would be shown in no other city in the state, has brought hundreds of patrons to the new show place from outside cities and towns. This production has been acclaimed by the Detroit critics the most pretentious affair of its character yet seen in the west, and vast audiences have assembled nightly to hear its thunderous choruses and enjoy its visual beauties. "The Vagabond King" goes into its third big week at the Cas with next Sunday night's performance. Brought from New York in its entirety, the cast is a stupendous one, totaling 125 members, the "Vagabond Chorus" alone numbering more than 60. The song of the Vagabonds in the high light among the many fine ensembles in the Frim store, both of such thrilling character as to carry the auditor along in its spirit of enthusiasm and frenzy. Matinees at the Cas are given only on Saturday. The performances are at 8:15, evenings, and 2:15 Saturday afternoon.

"The Garrick Gaieties" will remain for another week at the Garrick Theater, Detroit, where it has met with much enthusiasm among theatergoers.

It has been said with some justice, that there is nothing new in the theater but that each presentation of an old theme takes on a new importance, certain new values, when it is retold, with a particularly fine skill.

There is an exception to all rules however and the "Garrick Gaieties" seems to stand completely away from any of the revue form on entertainment. An evening's entertainment that can fill a New York theater for two seasons and meet with the unstinted praise of the foremost critics of the metropolis, must possess something different from the usual traditions of the theater. Given the usual care and discriminating good taste that characterize all of the Theater Guild's stage achievements, it really offers an evening's entertainment that one is safe in saying is different. It is the first of the intimate revues to go on tour and it is a certainty that its reception has been most cordial.

The original cast will be seen here through its limited engagement of two weeks, including William Griffith, Virginia Watson, Hal Thompson, William Johnson, Eleanor Shaler, Hildegard Halliday, William MacAree, Gladys Laird, Sylvia Shear, and a chorus exceptionally lithe, dainty, and easy to look upon.
