

DRAWS 60-DAY TERM FOR DRUNKEN DRIVING

Wyandotte Man Also Fined \$50 And Costs When Tried By Judge Buck.

Earl Fogarty, 327 Walnut street, Wyandotte, was found guilty of driving drunk when brought before Justice of Peace Floyd S. Buck late last week, and was fined \$50 and costs and 60 days in jail, or 90 days in jail if he fails to pay. Assistant Prosecutor Clarence L. Smith handled the case for the people.

Vliet Says Education Has Definite Duty To Make Lives Of Laborers Rich.

"Education should make more palatable the humbler tasks of life. That, according to Clarence Vliet, superintendent of schools, is the working idea of the Better Schools League, an organization to improve and promote education and methods of education in this country.

Mr. Vliet cites the case of a young college man who dug ditches during his vacations to gain health and wealth for the next school year.

"He told me of an Italian working with him who would burn snatches of opera while he labored of an Irishman who would discuss political issues, and an American who analyzed economic conditions while he worked."

Mr. Vliet said.

"None of these men was as efficient as in a degree intellectually developed. Yet the lives of all of them were richer, their resources were greater. It would be indeed unfortunate, as the league says, if it were necessary to conserve ignorance in order to furnish an adequate labor supply."
