

This Week State and County News Briefly Told

BENTON HARBOR - Benjamin Parnell, again founder and leader of the House of David, arrested early Wednesday inside the colony after a world-wide search of more than three years was released on \$50,000 bail after being arraigned in Justice Court on serious statutory charges brought by two former girl members of the sect.

The bond was signed by Edith Madrum, and Frank Rosetta, House of David members. It was secured by the colony's \$160,000 hotel building in Benton Harbor which during the night was headed by colony officials to Miss Madrum and Rosetta. Four men members and three women, arrested in the state police raid on the colony and charged with obstructing justice, were also released under bond. Parnell's examination was set for December 22. "King Ben" who built the colony as a scattered membership of nearly 1,000 men and women, was carried into the court of Justice Elizabeth Farnham by four board members of the sect. A case in his hand shook visibly. He remained silent during the short court proceedings.

At the Hall-Mills Murder Trial

PONTIAC—Postmaster Floyd B. Babcock announced his resignation as postmaster of Pontiac, Wednesday to take effect as soon as he can be relieved from the real estate business.

Mr. Babcock's resignation came as a surprise to his many friends, for to engage in his duties. He expects to succeed Elmer E. Hynes and received his commission in December. He has been actively in charge of his office since.

LANSING—If the estimates of his supporters are correct, Rev. Lynn C. Gardner of Howell, is assured the speakership of the 1927 House of Representatives. Members of the House who conferred with state officials here Tuesday claimed 59 of the 100 Representatives are pledged to support Rep. Gardner and that additional votes are in prospect.

IMLAY CITY—The home talent musical comedy, "Sweetheart Town" put on under auspices of the Exchange club, was a success in every way, practically every seat in the house having been sold in advance, with many single admissions on the opening night.

PONTIAC—In an ordinance given its first reading at the City Hall Tuesday the City Commission provides that underground conduits must be used for all wiring on city streets in the business section and that any replacements are made they must go underground.

LAFEE—Funeral services for Alanson Bliss, 75, of Deerfield Township were held Tuesday at the Baird Funeral Home, Rev. Hemingway officiating and burial was in Silas cemetery.

PORT HURON—Steps toward organizing the first chapter of the "Lafol Society," an organization to be composed of Protestants, Catholics and Jews, were taken here Tuesday when 32 Kivansians signed as charter members.

DETROIT—Peter Eli, king of Detroit kypsiacs, lies critically wounded in a hospital today. He was shot by one of three bandits who came to his quarters Wednesday and escaped with \$1,000.

DETROIT—Councilman Arthur E. Dingeman, who was injured in a taxi cab crash a month ago in Chicago while on an official trip, is again confined to his home and will undergo an X-ray examination to learn if he was hurt internally.

DETROIT—After having been bound and gagged five hours, Edward A. Lovely, 660 Seward avenue, wealthy realtor, freed himself Wednesday and reported five burglars had ransacked his home and fled with \$30,000 loot.

PONTIAC—Concrete will be poured on the 1,100-foot sink hole on M-10 next Monday if unfavorable weather does not delay the work. Excess dirt which has been placed on the roadway to cause settling will be completely removed and a 48-inch reinforced concrete drain across the road will be completed by Tuesday. The road will probably be opened to traffic by the middle of December.

DETROIT—Testimony of M. M. Harry Sowers yesterday resulted in Gaylord Linder, University of Michigan student, being bound over to Circuit Court on a charge of robbery armed. Mrs. Sowers testified in Justice Court that she faced a pistol in Linder's hands during a holdup of her husband's road house at Plymouth and Farmington roads last June 2.

LANSING—Serious damage to the Michigan bean crop was caused by unfavorable weather during the harvesting season, according to a report today by Verne L. Church, federal agricultural statistician and L. Whitney Watkins, state agricultural commissioner.

UNTESTED MILK PUT UNDER BAN

Milk companies delivering other than tuberculin tested milk in Birmingham will be given 10 days to show that they will produce test milk as the village ordinance requires. James Anderson, chief of police stated. It is said that two companies distributing in the southern part of the village, are not complying with the ordinance in this respect in that it will be necessary to have caps on the bottles stating that the milk is tuberculin tested, Chief Anderson declares.
