LOCKED IN COAL BIN

They locked him in a small coal bin in the rear, and after waiting his again to be quiet, departed. On the way out they assured the two customers that Larsen directly would wait on them.

Larsen said they both appeared cool and that they did not act "tough." One of the robbers he described as being about 5 feet 9 inches tall and weighing 170 pounds. He was dressed in a light-colored coat and cap and was a blond, Larsen declared. His companion was of dark complexion and dressed in dark clothes. He was about three inches shorter than the other and weighed approximately 135 pounds, police were told.

Neither was masked and Larsen says he believes he would be able to identify them with ease. They showed him one revolver and that was of 32 calibre, Larsen says.

First Daylight Hold Up
According to police records this is the first daylight store hold up in the history of the village. The last hold up in Birmingham was more than a year ago at the Atlantic & Pacific store at Lincoln and Woodward avenues.

Larsen lives at 92 Gerald street and Highland Park, and has been manager of the store at Brown street and Woodward avenue since October. He was employed by the company in Highland Park previous to that time. The store has been opened since September when the building was completed.

Officials of the company declare hold ups are numerous about Christmas time and indicate that the robbery Monday was merely the forerunner of the "hush" season. Letters had been sent to all store managers a few days previous to the robbery warning them of this and telling them to keep but a small sum of money in the cash registers.

Each season a flock of between 5,000 and 10,000 wild geese visits the Miner place. Mr. Miner spends about \$6,000 annually in feeding the birds alone. Some of this is donated by friends who are interested in his work.

He has written a book, "Jack Miner and His Birds," that is one of the best selling bird books on the market. In spite of his limited schooling, his warm humor and enthusiasm for his subjects have made one of the most worth-while books on birds and bird-lore extant.

Is An American
Strangely enough, although his name has all been carried on in Canada, Jack Miner was born in Dover Centre, O., 61 years ago, and lived there until he was about 13 years old.

That his fame is widespread is attested by the receipt of letters from King George V. of England, President Coolidge, the Prince of Wales, and many others expressing their appreciation of his book.

Thousands of tourists route their way so that they can stop at Kingsville and visit Jack Miner's bird sanctuary. A large part of the settlers in Kingsville, which is situated in the most southern part of Ontario, about 25 miles from Detroit, are estimated to have come there first to see Miner's place and settled because of their interest in the work and the charm of living near such a place.

Jack Miner has made not only himself famous, but his home, his town, and even his birds, and Monday evening he will give a free lecture to the men and boys of Birmingham.
