**Marathoners End Season's Work**

Baldwin's cross-country team completed its season with the state meet in this order for Birmingham: Williams, Bradley, Harper and Wollaston. George Williams has put forth a real effort in practice and was successful in the two dual meets which were scheduled. Birmingham won from Royal Oak and lost to the stellar Pontiac barriers.

Eighteen schools were entered in the State meet, totaling 108 runners competing. The Baldwin men, facing a strenuous test of endurance, placed in this order for Birmingham: Williams, Bradley, Harper and Wollaston. Unable to place five runners at the finish, the local team failed to receive an M. I. A. A. standing.

Prospects for a next year's hill and dale team seem very good. A. L. Van Winkle, coach of the cross-country squad, says that there is plenty of material, which can be developed to an even greater extent than this season.

**Doherty Leads March**

In the beginning of the second quarter after Wyandotte had punted, the Maroon and White started a march with Doherty as ground gainer, who ended only when a placekick from the 25 yard line went wide. Birmingham threatened the home team's goal many times only to lose the ball to the down starters who booted it to safety. Wyandotte completed one pass in this period and the half ended, lost the ball on a fumble.

Baldwin opened the third quarter by kicking off. Wyandotte lost on the first play and on the next, Thomson skirted the end, with the help of interference, for 30 yards ending in a touch-down. Bell was unable to kick another point. This period was marked by great number of punts by both sides. Baldwin punted and Wyandotte lost, as the quarter ended, after making one first down.

**Teams Deadlocked**  
The fourth period found the teams in a deadlock, with Wyandotte having a slight advantage at times. The oval was booted frequently, neither side finding a chance to cross the opponent's last white strip.

Thomson and Doherty were the ball carriers in the Baldwin backfield and Yack proved to be a mainstay for the down starters. Bell did some excellent punting; Brown was handicapped by an injured leg. The forward wall showed up exceedingly well, allowing the home team only three first downs. Brien, a new man,
