MUDDY FIELD CAUSES SCORLESS TIE GAME

Maroon and White Fight Even, Muddy Battle Against Richmond

Birmingham was held to a scoreless tie Thursday by Richmond High, who gave the local team some real opposition. The game was considerably slowed up by the mud and water which covered Burnam field. Neither team seemed able to overcome this handicap enough to score. Richmond in the first period, after kicking off, worked the ball to a position where they attempted a field

A forward pass over the goal line, with no interference, slipped off the fingers of the Richmond receiver and their chance of scoring was lost. Maroon and White took the ball on downs.

A bad punt in the second quarter from the goal line gave Richmond the ball in scoring territory. Birmingham took the oval on downs and punted from the 20 yard line. After Richmond carried the ball in the majority of cases.

This game furnished very little thrill either for the spectators or players. With the bad weather conditions it left the team's followers rather pessimistic and dissatisfied. The team did perhaps have an off day, but Richmond's true strength was a surprise to both the team and the fans.

Birmingham kicked off in the second half and Doherty pushed the ball down the field on successive plays. Doherty brought the ball to the goal line but the ball was lost with inches to go. The ball was sawed back and forth in Richmond territory the remainder of the quarter.

The last period was played in Richmond territory but the Maroon and White team was unable to score. The final gun found the ball on Richmond's 22 yard line. Thomson made an end run of 20 yards in this quarter.

Student Presentation of 'Pinafore' Shows Results of Work

The principals were especially well fitted for their parts and the choruses showed the results of their long and careful training by the excellent ensemble work. About 800 were present. Elizabeth Luscombe and Monzelle Hoffman divided honors in the heavy female roles, the former being an excellent "Buttercup" and the latter a most charming heroine. Catherine Brown did splendidly in the part of Hero.

Unprejudiced critics gave Fred Whittlesey a slight edge in the male roles, for he did admirably the difficult impersonation of "Honorable Sir Joseph." Clarence McMullin's fine voice showed to advantage in the role of Capt. Corcoran and William Spencer showed excellently as "Ralph" the humble sailor, who finally won heroine's hand. William Dawson was the only one in school who could have acted the clown part of "Jack Dandey." He kept the audience in an uproar. Bennett delighted his admirers for he demonstrated that he possesses ability on the stage as well as on the gridiron. Miss Ethel Hilton deserves untiring praise for the direction of the performance, for it was carefully and capably done. Miss Evangeline Pirsell proved a most able assistant. Eero Saarinen designed the stage set and it was done as only Eero knows how to do things. Howard Crull lent his ever willing assistance in helping to hang the scenery. Carpenter Hewitt, Frank Higby and Harry Bradley worked untiringly in helping with stage and properties and Leland Gunn handled the ticket sale in a capable manner.

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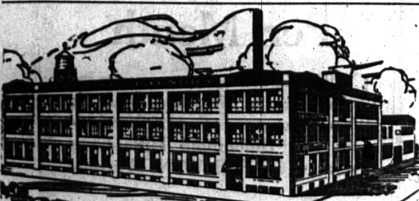
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56 STUDENTS NAMED ON NEW HONOR ROLL

BIRDS FAVORED BY JACK MINER

To combat the falling off of birds in numbers in the United States, Jack Miner, ornithologist of international fame, believes the study of birds should occupy a larger place in the courses of instruction offered in the schools.

"If there is one thing in the world that will accomplish a great deal toward overcoming the tendency to extinction on the part of many species of birds, it is a better understanding of them on the part of man," Mr. Miner told a student reporter after his talk at the Baldwin High School Monday night.

"There is a great deal to be learned from birds," he said "but first man has a great deal to learn about birds. One good place to obtain this knowledge would be in the schools."
