There come interesting echoes for the play called "Croala," acted by Richard Bennett, among others, and produced two weeks ago in San Francisco.

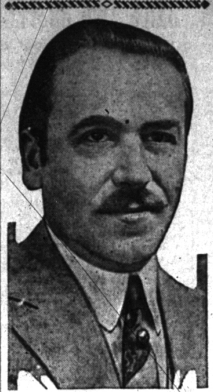

WHEN I WAS TWENTY-ONE

At 21—Charles W. Elliot, Famous Educator, Was Already a Teacher.

"AT TWENTY-ONE I was a tutor at Harvard.

"In my freshman year I became much interested in chemistry, and from the beginning of my sophomore year I had the privilege of working in the small chemical laboratory which Josiah Parsons Cooke, instructor in chemistry, was allowed to set up at his own expense in the basement of University Hall.

"During the last three years of my college course I did much work in that little laboratory every week. In addition to attending all the recitations required of my class, and doing well in all the studies of the regular course, to the best of my knowledge I was the only undergraduate at Harvard college who had the privilege of studying a science by the laboratory method.

"At that time also I joined a new boat club which was mainly recruited among professional students and was intended to furnish pleasure and exercise to its members, but not to prepare men for the races. As I proved to the club to be a strong and enduring oarsman, I was invited to join the Harvard crew because it had proved impossible to find six undergraduates competent and willing to row—Charles W. Elliot."

Doctor Elliot was one of the most famous educators of the country. He died a short time ago at the age of ninety-two. He was active in his work almost to the time of his death.

REGISTRATION NOTICE Saturday, Nov. 27, 1926 NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that in conformity with Act 126, Public Acts of 1917, I, the undersigned Village Clerk, will upon any day except Sunday and a legal holiday, or the day of any regular or special election or official primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Village not already registered, who may apply to me personally for such registration, except that I can receive no names for registration on the day of the meeting of the Board of Registration. Notice is further hereby given that the Board of Registration for Precinct 1, will meet at the Voting Booth at the corner of Hyman Avenue and North Woodward Avenue, and the Board for Precinct 2 will meet in the Commission Room in the Village Hall, corner Martin and Pierce Streets, and the Board for Precinct 3 will meet at Voting Booth, S. W. corner of Lincoln and So. Woodward, on Saturday, November 27, 1926, from 7:00 o'clock A. M. to 8:30 o'clock P. M. (Central Standard Time) of said day for the purpose of completing the list of qualified electors of said Village. Precinct 1, is all that territory North of the Center Line of Maple Avenue. Precinct 2, is all that territory South of the Center Line of Maple Avenue and North of the Center Line of Lincoln Avenue. Precinct 3, is all that territory South of the Center Line of Lincoln Avenue. The name of no person but an actual resident of said Village at the time of registration, and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote in the next election, shall be entered in the registration book. REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, and shall UNDER OATH, state that he or she is a resident of said Village TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he or she possesses other qualifications of an elector under the Constitution; and that owing to sickness or bodily infirmity of himself, or some other member of his family, or owing to his absence from the Village on public business or his own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registration of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he shall then be permitted to vote at such election. If such applicant shall, in said matter, willfully make any false statement, he shall be deemed guilty of perjury and, upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof. WOMEN ELECTORS The names of all qualified women electors not already appearing on the registration list will be registered provided personal application is made in conformity with the foregoing provisions.
