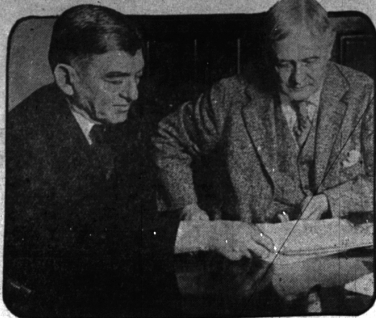


Map Campaign to Protect Mails

Nothing New in Modern Travel According to Century Old Ads

Luxury on railroads is not a twentieth century idea, if railroad advertising of a half-century ago is to be taken seriously. The nineteenth century also traveled in style. It had no shower baths, barber shops, women's smoking compartments or photo stenographers on its trains, but 50 years ago there were coaches that spoke their own "last word" in luxury, and their advertisements used as glowing terms as any employed to describe the modern train de luxe today, with its staterooms, gymnasium and moving picture salon.

A Chicago and Atlantic Railway advertisement of 1879 offered smoking cars with a buffet "where the traveler may lunch at his leisure" and Pullmans aglow with "brilliant Pintsch gaslight." The road declared itself "excellent, if equalled, by any other road in the world."

"The sleeping, drawing room and thoroughfare coaches are simply models of elegance," runs the advertisement; "the trains are of uniform external appearance; the interior is the perfection of railroad appointment. They are fitted with every appliance for safety and comfort that the requirements of modern travel have prompted inventive genius to provide."

Forty-odd years ago the Erie & Chicago line, now the Erie Railroad, offered "palace hotels on wheels," with "elegant family rooms" and "all the delicacies of the season at popular prices."

The fastest westbound express in 1882 took thirty-six and a half hours as compared with today's twenty-four journey. And there were only two such expresses daily. One left New York at 9 a. m. and reached

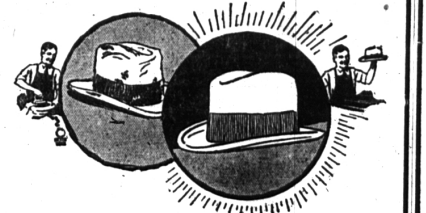

COOLIDGE Says...

"Advertising is the life of trade, and aids extensively in the maintenance of the American scale of wages—the main support of the home market."

"It seems to me probable that in all our economic life the element on which we are inclined to place too low an estimate is advertising.

"As we turn through the pages of the press . . . I doubt if we realize at all the impressive part which these displays (advertisements) are coming more and more to play in modern life.

"Advertising creates and changes the foundation of all popular action, public sentiment, or public opinion. It is the most potent influence in adopting, in changing the habits, the modes of life, affecting what we eat, what we wear, and the work and play of the whole nation.
