(Continued from Page 1, Part 1) her turn and found out that there are a small number of people who are interested in the Community House who were being taught English and social studies by Mrs. Bruce Miller, and that the girls were getting acquainted with each other as well as with the American language.

The classes are now under way and are increasing daily, but new recruits are checked every week, particularly in the arithmetic class which has just been started under Mrs. Bruce Miller. Five girls registered this week and will meet each Friday evening and they are anxious to add to their number. A nominal fee of \$1.00 is charged for the course. Mrs. Miller will start her class in a review of the simple processes in arithmetic and progress into compound arithmetic as the class demands it.

The 13 girls in Mrs. Harry Conine's sewing class are divided into two groups and during their 13 weeks course will cut, fit and make their own garments and learn the principles as they go. The three electric sewing machines for this class are loaned by Mrs. L. H. Walden, Mrs. Bruce Miller and Mrs. H. B. Whalen.

There are 11 women in a class for advanced English and current topics taught by Mrs. L. H. Walden, Mrs. W. Q. Manchester and they will meet every second and fourth Mondays.

A "trittle" from the Latin "tritus," meaning "old," is a distinguishing mark used over a letter for purposes of pronunciation, as the title over the "m" in canon. It is accepted, too, as meaning a particle, anything with out value or significance.

"Joy," though of different derivation, has the same significance. Taken from the Greek "glaia," it signifies the dot over the "i" or "y" point of a title. It is also used figuratively to describe anything of the slightest value.
