

OPPOSITION APPEARS AGAINST ANNEXATION

Hazel Park Citizens Protest Against Proposed Measure

Royal Oak—Opponents to the annexation of Hazel Park to the city of Detroit sent a special delegation this week to the office of Secretary of State Charles DeLand to see what measures could be taken to prevent the question of annexation coming to a vote next Tuesday. It is the hope of this body that some irregularities will be found in the petition that has been filed with Secretary DeLand and falling this is promised some court action may ensue.

With an announcement that Mayor John W. Smith and Detroit officials are opposed to the annexation, at this time it is not considered ripe, new life has been instilled in the opposition in Oakland County. It is believed that the project is being pushed by the large real estate dealers in Detroit and Hazel Park and is not desired by the city of Detroit at large.

Hazel Park has in the past year received more benefits and more attention from Royal Oak Township than it would have received from Detroit in 10 years, according to Judge W. Byron Newman, of Ferndale.
