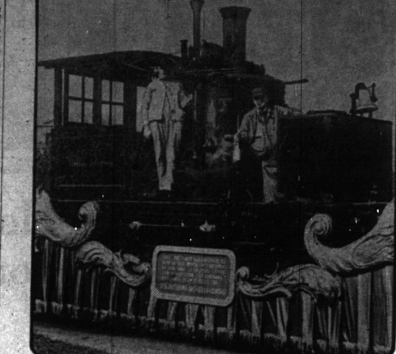


F. L. Maytag, chairman of the board of the Maytag company of Newton, Ia., washing machine manufacturer, is the proud possessor of what is said to be the largest and costliest gold medallion in the world, valued at \$100,000.00.

Governor John Hammill, of Iowa, presented the medallion to Mr. Maytag recently at a banquet at the Hotel Savary, Des Moines. The banquet was attended by 350 members of the Maytag sales organization from all parts of the United States. The medallion was a gift from the Home Appliance Merchants of American industry.

Governor Hammill lauded Mr. Maytag in his speech as one of the outstanding citizens of Iowa and as a man who has done more than any other man in state to advance the electrical industry. The Governor referred to Mr. Maytag's loyalty to Iowa, his loyalty to the industry he represented, and to his efforts to build up the electrical business in the United States.

The banquet was the climax of a convention of Maytag dealers from all parts of the United States. The convention itself was held in Newton, Iowa, and all of the dealers were transported by special trains to Des Moines where the presentation of the medallion took place. Governor Hammill, who has been a line long friend of Mr. Maytag, presented the medallion last before the banquet, and both men received a rousing reception at the conclusion of the ceremonies.

To vote against the Constitutional Amendments make a cross (X) in the square in front of the word "No." PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION: Relative to Creation of Metropolitan Districts. Amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution relative to the creation of metropolitan districts by cities, villages or townships. Sec. 21. The Legislature shall by general law provide for the incorporation by any two or more cities, villages, townships, or any combination or parts of same, of metropolitan districts comprising territory within their limits, for the purpose of securing, owning and operating either for public utility, or for the purpose of supplying sewer, disposal, drainage, water, light, power or transportation, or any combination thereof, and any such district may sell or purchase, either within or without its limits as may be prescribed by law, sewage disposal or drainage rights, water, light, power or transportation facilities. Any such district shall have power to acquire and succeed to any or all of the rights, obligations and property of such cities, villages or townships respecting or connected with such functions or public utilities. Provided that no city, village or township shall surrender any such rights, obligations or property without the approval thereof by a majority vote of the electors thereof voting on such question. Such general law shall limit the power of taxation and restrict their rates of levies, borrowings and contracting debts. Under such general law, the electors of each district shall have the authority to approve or disapprove and amend its charter upon the approval of a majority vote of the electors of each city, village or township regularly constituted authority, and through its voters on such question, and to pass all laws and ordinances relating to its municipal and special services of the constitution and general laws of this State. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION: Relative to Confession of Excess Land and Property for Boardwalks, Streets, Etc. Amendment to Article XIII of the Constitution relative to confession of excess land and property for boardwalks, streets, etc. Sec. 2. Subject to this Constitution the Legislature may authorize municipalities, subject to reasonable limitations, to condemn or to take the fee in more land and property than is needed in the acquiring, owning and widening of boardwalks, streets and alleys, or for any public use, and after so much of the land and property has been appropriated for any such needed public purpose, the remainder may be sold or leased with or without such restrictions as may be appropriate to the improvement made. Bonds may be issued to supply the funds to pay in whole or in part for the excess property so appropriated, but such bonds shall be a lien only on the property so acquired and they shall not be included in any limitation of the bonded indebtedness of such municipality. Four Per Cent Penalty Now Due on Village Taxes
