The object of the Section for the United States of the League for Peace and Freedom is to study and promote that peace between nations, races and classes which is based upon justice and good will, to prevent war; to substitute law for war; and to co-operate with women from other countries who are working for the same ends.

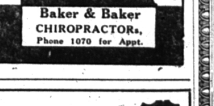

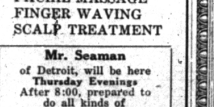
