When time came to vote at Precinct No. 1 it was discovered that there was not enough cloth to enclose the various booths. Someone, hurriedly dispatched to buy the goods at the nearest store, returned with an arm full of the brightest green asten. Probably believed in the power of subconscious suggestion.

Two women who had never voted before are reported to have asked persons at precinct No. 2 whether it was true that they had to have their finger prints taken.

George E. Averill, publisher of The Eccentric, was presented in turn with green ribbons, a green handkerchief, a green pepper and green fees, from a golf club, before noon Tuesday.

A bewildered appearing fellow passed out cards in front of one of the precincts near here the whole day. He said he did not know what was on the cards; that he couldn't read.

Election day brought out many persons who have not been downtown in years. Several, well advanced in years, were on street corners discussing the election and the recent changes in Birmingham. All of this indicated to those who are familiar with elections and people, a heavy vote.

A band passed through Birmingham Monday night from Hazel Park to Pontiac. The members had a musical rally dedicated to Sheriff Frank Schram, Prosecutor Clyde D. Underwood and A. W. Peitren, candidate for coroner.

"Ar for heaven's sake" was the accolade given the news that Green was leading Groesbeck by 130,000 by a woman who called The Eccentric office for returns.

Precinct No. 5, Bloomfield Township, had their returns in the township office ahead of all others. While the vote there was comparatively light, members of the board counted with great speed and were finished a short time after 10 p. m.

The county's leading politicians gathered in the Oakland County Jail Tuesday night for election returns. Cards, a radio and general political discussions helped pass the time between regular trips to the nearest restaurant for an eye-opening cup of coffee.

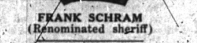
Sheriff Frank Schram, who has been ill for the past week retired early after he saw the wide margin by which he was leading the field.

Wednesday, Birmingham settled back into its usual routine and election talk dwindled as the day progressed.



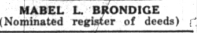

## 'MY COUNTRY' OPENS LAFAYETTE, DETROIT

Comedy Has To Do With The Love Of Youth Of Different Races For One Another.

The new season has scored a hit in "My Country," the comedy which comes to the Shubert-Lafayette next Sunday evening, Sept. 10th. The play is called by the critics the "funniest show of the season."

The play deals with the family difficulties of Mr. Robert Van Dorn, a \$2 a week clerk of the Barnett Oil Company. Mr. Van Dorn comes from old Dutch stock and cannot tolerate the changing character of his neighborhood. When he learns that his son is in love with the daughter of an Italian neighbor his temper breaks its bounds and he threatens to send his son from home.

"I don't see to what he can object in me," says Mariana, the Italian girl in the play. "If I were Jewish it would be different."

To make matters worse Alice Van Dorn, the only daughter of the household of the Dutch descendants is in love with the son of the Jewish neighbors to the right of the Van Dorn home.

In the cast of the comedy are several exceptional comedians. Lee Kohlmar who once appeared with David Warfield in "The Music Master" and Pola Carter, have the roles of the Blumbers, the Jewish neighbors of the Van Dorns and the parents of Lester, who is in love with Alice Van Dorn. Joseph B. Verdi who has the role of the father of Mariana is extremely capable but this is to be expected for it was he who introduced Italian comedy on the stage over 25 years ago.
