

# OIL STATION ROBBERS AWAIT SENTENCES

## Pair Who Stole From American Oil Company Up Monday

Two men who robbed the American Oil Company gasoline station, Woodward avenue, south of Maple street, the night of Aug. 24, will be sentenced Monday in Circuit Court.

They are Fred Shaver, 22 years old, 212 Delmar street, Royal Oak, and Dan Bussey, 34 years old, Fontenot, both arrested on charges of robbery.

Serg. Clark Green arrested the pair in Royal Oak where they were waiting the day after the burglary. Most of the \$60 lost was recovered. Bussey was a former employe at the station.

# CHRIST CHURCH CARVED DOOR IS NOW EXHIBITED

## Large Work of Art by Kirchmayer Shows Freedom of Expression

The carved door for the new Christ Church of Cranbrook is completed and on exhibition at the home of the Society of Arts and Crafts, 47 Watson street, Detroit. This is the first of the group of carvings for the building to be completed by John Kirchmayer of Boston.

The door measures 28 1/2 inches in width by 85 1/2 inches in length, and it is made of dull oak. It is a study of St. Thomas in the church, Gothic arch of interlacing grape vines symbolizing the church. The arch is above the central figure of St. Thomas, and the whole panel is framed at the top with a procession of the arts and along the sides with various figures of angels.

Because it was Mr. Booth's wish that the carver might be free to execute himself fully in his work, the artist has made use of a favorite custom among the craftsmen of all centuries—that of inserting the features of contemporaries in the wood about the central subject. One can find, among the busy figures in the niches, many well known craftsmen. Mr. Murray, the architect, is there, and even Mr. Kirchmayer himself, both in splendid likenesses. A blacksmith, a stonemason, the architect, a painter, and the woodcarver are in procession.

Mr. Kirchmayer has done work before for Mr. Booth, and he executed the choir stalls at St. Paul's Cathedral in Detroit. He is a native of Orono, Maine, whence came the Passion Players who held an exhibition of objects d'art at Convention Hall, Detroit, two or three years ago. He has been here 50 years, and today, at the age of 70, he is considered one of the first craftsmen of his country.
