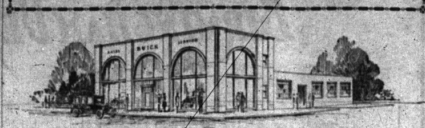

SOON TO BEGIN ANNUAL PLAY
With school underway for two weeks, members of the senior class have swung into action on an interesting year's program. Officers were elected and a tentative social plan made at the class meeting held this week.

Carpenter Hewitt was elected president and Monzelle Hoffman vice-president of the senior class. The office of secretary Jane Wall was chosen and David Gaffill was elected treasurer.

The two faculty advisors are Miss Emily Walker, instructor of mathematics and George Johnson, senior session room teacher.
Prepare Baldwinian.
The class is already hard at work selling the Baldwinian, senior class annual, according to Mr. Hewitt.

"It was found last year that the best method for selling the annual is to sell the rounds first—then publish the book. We know then just how many to print, and we don't find ourselves in the hole when it's all finished."
The sale began Monday and will last until Oct. 1.
"If we have not sold 500 copies at \$1.50 apiece by that time," Mr. Hewitt said, "we will refund the money to those already sold and not publish the annual at all. The prospects look very promising, however. Selling has gone pretty good so far."
