

## PROGRESS IS MADE IN COOLIDGE PAVING

Former Monnier Road Concrete For Southbound Traffic Soon To Open.

Coolidge highway (formerly Monnier road) is now being paved. Already the 20-foot concrete strip for northbound traffic on the artery is completed from Woodward avenue south through Jackson and Woodward-Monnier subdivisions.

The new 20-foot concrete road for southbound traffic, which is separated from the northbound lane by a parkway, will soon be completed from the Eight Mile north to Woodward avenue, it is stated.

"Coolidge highway is the most direct route from the north Detroit district to Ford's River Rouge plant on a line straight south. It will be the cut-off for traffic from the north to the west side. This intersection will in the near future be one of the most important if not the most important intersection, on all north Woodward avenue. It is the natural center of a great future business district. Already some 2,000 homes are within a mile radius of this intersection," according to Judson Bradley, local realtor.

"Coolidge highway cuts directly through our Woodward-Monnier subdivision in which will be installed every city improvement, sewer, water, cement sidewalks, gas and graded streets, and the property is carefully restricted to single residences. Some sites have been reserved for duplexes and apartment buildings, while business frontage on Woodward avenue and Monnier road has been restricted to buildings of solid masonry construction."

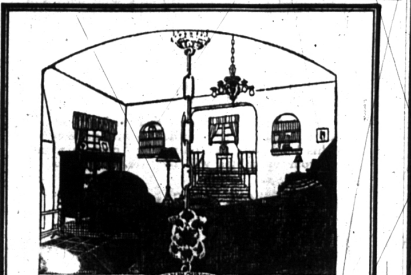
Her grandfather was Herbert Standing, English actor, who won fame before the moving picture camera in the United States. An all-star cast includes Louis Tellegen, and many others.
