Many Bed Rooms.

On the second floor will be the Senator's bedroom, Mrs. Couzens' bedroom, and three other bedrooms, one for each of the Senator's daughters; also a guest room. Each of the bedrooms in the family apartment will have a bathroom, in addition the second floor will be six rooms for the maids. On the third floor there will be a study and bedroom for the use of the Senator.

The interior finish of the residence will be of walnut with parquetry floors throughout and paneled ceilings. The house will be fire-proof throughout.

There will be a basement connection from the garage to the house and a heating plant in the basement of the garage with a dual system of coal and oil burner. All of the interior basement walls will be finished in white glazed brick and this same finish will be carried out in the interior walls of the garage. The roof will be

of variegated and graduated slate. The landscape about the residence will be terraced and laid out by landscape expert who has not yet been selected.

(Continued from Page 1, Part 1) plans will become the permanent property of the winner. Both this race and the preceding one will be ridden in colors. The entry fee is \$5.

The Burns Henry Memorial Challenge cup, presented by Edward P. Hammond, will be the object of the last race of the day.

This is for hunters to be ridden by men acceptable to the committee, with a minimum weight of 175 pounds. Half-breds will be allowed 10 pounds. The course will be about a mile and a half on the flat. The race will be ridden in colors, pink or uniform. A replica of the cup will be presented to the winner. The entry fee is \$10.

Conditions laid down by the committee, headed by William Hendrie, with J. A. Braun, M. F. Gagnier, E. Hammond, G. V. N. Lethrop, C. J. McDonald, E. S. Nichols, W. Seyburn, K. Stoepel, J. F. Williams, and C. C. Cunningham follow.

Any race with less than three starters may be declared off.

A Hunter is a horse eligible for a master's certificate.

Decisions of the stewards shall be final.

The race committee shall have full power to refuse to receive any entry, to disqualify any rider, or to change or alter any of the conditions of these races.

Where specifically covered by the above rules, the rules of the National Steeplechase and Hunt Association shall govern.

Neither the committee nor the association nor the owner of the premises where the races are held will be responsible for any damage or loss that may occur, and it is a condition of all entries that each entrant and rider shall hold the committee, the association and the owners of the premises blameless for any loss or accident, and that each entrant shall be responsible for any injury or damage caused by his entry.
