

REGISTRAR CANDIDATE HAS VARIED CAREER

Hert F. Griffin, Served County and Country in Several Capacities For Many Years.

Because of the number of requests for information regarding Hert F. Griffin, candidate for registrar of deeds in Oakland County, Mr. Griffin has summarized his life work, stating in a matter of fact some of the many important positions he has held. His own story follows:

He was born in Orion Township in 1882 and lived there until seven years ago when I moved with my family to Pontiac to act as secretary of the Pontiac Laundry Company. My early education was obtained in the public schools in Orion, and graduated from the Commercial Course of the Pontiac Business College in 1901. After leaving school I worked a farm for several years, and later engaged in the mercantile business in Orion, in the firm of Carlton and Griffin. I was also employed in the banking business with the Citizens' Savings Bank of Orion for some time. I was treasurer of the Monitor Fire Insurance Company, a farmers' Mutual company for Oakland County.

"During my entire life I have taken keen interest in public affairs and have held many positions of honor to the public and otherwise. Before moving to Pontiac I held the offices of treasurer, clerk and secretary of my township. I have always been active in the Republican Party and have worked in the county committee for many years.

"During the war I was chairman of the Liberty Loan, and was active in patriotic drives in Orion Township. I feel that my experience and education have amply qualified me for the position to which I aspire, and if I am elected to the office of Registrar of Deeds I shall aim to perfect an efficient organization that will displace the business of the office efficiently and economically, and at all times with the courtesy and consideration that the people of Oakland County have the right to expect."

ADEQUATE WIRING IS ESSENTIAL IN HOME

Modern Home Should Contain Many Convenient Outlets.

Adequate wiring of the home itself is the first essential for obtaining full satisfaction from electric appliances, according to Bird & Ryder, local electrical dealers. The modern home should contain many convenient outlets, to be practicable, sufficient outlets must be provided both for lighting purposes and for connecting appliances.

One of the most obvious faults of inadequate wiring, said Mr. Bird, occurs when the wiring is such that becomes necessary to use lighting fixtures for connecting appliances. Hanging cords give the room a slightly appearance. There is also the danger of over-loading the wiring.

Lighting fixtures are not designed for connecting appliances and should never be used for this purpose. In planning the wiring, sufficient convenience outlets should be included so that lighting fixtures may be used for lighting purposes.

In the living room, it is well to plan one double convenience outlet for every 12 feet of running wall space, including openings, and in the dining room one for every 15 feet. Since wall brackets are becoming such an important part in the plan of home lighting, it is advisable to so space them as to obtain the best lighting and decorative effect. In planning for wall brackets, one socket outlet should be provided for every 15 running wall feet in the living room and dining room.

The selection of the lighting equipment deserves most careful study. The decorative value should be seriously considered. Colors in tones subdued so as not to conflict with other decorations are very good. The finish of fixtures, the fittings should harmonize with other furnishings in the room and the most satisfactory effect from the standpoint of artistic design and finish is obtained in fittings made of aluminum or a combination of aluminum and wrought iron. In these a permanent finish is obtained which retains its decoration indefinitely with practically no care.

In addition to the decorative value of the design, the lighting fittings should be considered from the standpoint of correct distribution and diffusion of light. This will depend somewhat upon the size of the room, the height of the ceiling and arrangement of the room.

Lack of adequate wiring is poor economy, for electricity is one of the cheapest commodities used in the home. The average family spends \$48.20 per year for candle while only \$25.00 is spent for lighting. While the cost of living has risen 65% since 1913, the cost of electricity has steadily declined.

The comfort and pleasure derived from adequate wiring in the home far exceeds the insignificant added cost in providing an ample supply of outlets.

Readjustment of Long Distance Rates Is Effected Throughout U. S.

General readjustment of long distance telephone rates between points in Michigan and points outside the state and in the various night period during which reduced rates apply, are announced by Robert J. Coyle, manager here for the Michigan Telephone Company, changes become effective October 1. Mr. Coyle states that these changes are made in the interests of the public convenience and to eliminate service difficulties encountered under the present schedule of rates. Points outside the state. Readjustment of long distance rates between points within the state were made effective July 10.

According to the telephone official, the out-of-state readjustment rates will be saving to the telephone users of the United States approximately \$3,000,000 a year. To points outside the state 150 miles or more distant, rates will be substantially reduced as they already have between points in Michigan. The reduction will become greater with increased distance. For example, from Detroit to St. Louis the basic station-to-station rate will be \$2.00 instead of the present \$2.50; instead of \$7.40 to Denver, to San Francisco, \$9.30. Instead of \$13.40, there will be a 25% discount possible partially through the use of long distance cables, vacuum tube apparatus and other improved apparatus and methods resulting from the continuous scientific research and development applied to the telephone system.

Many rates for distances between 24 and 110 miles will be adjusted to the present schedule of rates. The reduced rate night and evening period has been lengthened one and a half hours, under the proposed schedule of rates. For example, from station-to-station (Anyone) calls will begin at 7 p. m., instead of 8:30 p. m. formerly. The discount is approximately 50 per cent of the day station-to-station (Anyone) rates between 8:30 p. m. and 4:30 a. m. These discounts will apply on calls on which the station-to-station (Anyone) rate is 40 cents or more, with a minimum reduced rate of 35 cents. Because of the unsatisfactory service conditions encountered under the discount still in effect on calls to points outside Michigan between midnight and 4:30 a. m., that discount is to be discontinued.

By lengthening the period of the reduced rates on this class of calls, the rate will be only five cents, but complications of service after midnight which have resulted in delays and have caused many complaints, the facilities and the employees, will be eliminated, very largely. The midnight reduction, he states, has made it necessary, particularly in the larger centers, to retain on duty large forces of operators to care for merely a brief period. It is anticipated that with the longer reduced rate period, many of these calls will be made during other hours.

The extension of the reversed long distance rates, which have been in effect since July 10, will be adjusted to the present schedule of rates. The reduced rate night and evening period has been lengthened one and a half hours, under the proposed schedule of rates. For example, from station-to-station (Anyone) calls will begin at 7 p. m., instead of 8:30 p. m. formerly. 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charge privilege to station-to-station (Anyone) calls, both day and night rates, is another advantage to the user of the long distance service included in the proposed changes. This will apply on all calls of this classification in which the rate is 25 cents or more. In the past, this privilege has been applied only to person-to-person (Particular Person) calls. With the ever-increasing use of the long distance service, however, and with many occasions arising in which reverse rates of charges would be an advantage to the customer who pays for a certain number, the company has decided to extend this privilege.
