

POSITION EXPLAINED BY STATE CANDIDATE

James, Seeking Post in State Legislature, Would Abolish State Police. Russell C. Jones, candidate for the Republican nomination as representative in the state legislature in this district, makes the following statement of his position: "I am a candidate for the office of state representative in the legislature, first district, Oakland county, and with it elected, work for laws beneficial to the working class, equity and economy in state taxation. "Abolish the state police, giving this work to the sheriff who can handle it without the expense of maintaining this force."

"Higher rating on the working-men's compensation act, making it come in effect after three days instead of eight days as at present. "Modification of the prohibition law if it becomes a state question to permit the worker to have his beer the same as the wealthy. "If elected, I will try and be a conscientious, tireless worker at all times. "I was raised on a farm near Cass City, and am familiar with farm problems as well as city. At present I am a worker at the Ford factory. In this position I am familiar with labor conditions. I also operate a lunch and sandwich shop in Hazel Park."
