

## DRIVER IN JAIL AFTER ACCIDENT

**Buck Sentences Man To Imprisonment Till Damage Is Paid**

William Tansey, 5428 Stanton avenue, Detroit, is in the Oakland County jail today pending his payment of a \$150 damage settlement. Tansey was arrested April 7 when his car collided with one

driven by Frank Hager, 13207 Woodward Wilson avenue, Detroit, at Woodward avenue and Oak street, damaging Hager's car to the extent of \$150.

Tansey's sentence, on a charge of drunkenness to which he pleaded guilty Friday in Judge Floyd S. Buck's justice court, was \$25 and 30 days, the jail sentence to be withdrawn as soon as the damage is paid to Hager's car.

James Thompson, 602 east Canfield avenue, Detroit, who was driving Tansey's car, was fined \$25 for reckless driving. Officer Harry Johnson made the arrests.

### \$252,000 VILLAGE BUDGET IS PASSED BY COMMISSION

W. Nevitt for an appropriation of \$12,450 for the health department was cut by him to \$8,430 and commissioners granted that allowance.

The police department appropriation calls for the hiring of 10 new men. The former budget provided for three men. A telephone call system will be installed in the village at a cost of \$1,000. This is a reduction from the \$6,300 figure first cited. The telephone system will enable officers on patrol duty to report at designated intervals to the police station and will enable the office to get in immediate touch with the patrolmen on their beats, Chief Anderson said.

**Conference Called**  
No provision was made for the increase of salaries of members of the police department but a conference will be held between Chief Anderson and James W. Parry, new village manager, shortly after he takes office. It is expected that raises will be put through at that time.

Request of members of the library board for a full mill which would give the library an appropriation of \$14,000 for the year was turned down. The board was allowed \$9,500. Last year the appropriation was \$6,300.

Fire Chief William Olsen believes the regular firemen should be put on at once rather than wait until the last three months of the year as the budget provides.

"It would not be necessary to wait until the fire hall is completed," he said. "With six men on now and the other two to be hired later, we could have four regular men in the daytime and two at night. They would not then have to sleep at the station. This would enable us to make necessary inspections."

**Would Start Now**  
"If we will need eight men in the fall it certainly seems to me we need six now," he added.

Legal expenses provided for in the budget amount to \$2,000. Of this the village attorney is to be paid a salary of \$1,000.

Commissioners cut \$6,500 from the department of streets by voting a proposal to buy a street sweeper which would cost that much.

Mrs. Retta Barr, chairman of the library board will preside during the program and Rev. R. M. Atkins will pronounce the benediction at the close.

Mrs. Barr is collecting the papers and pictures which will rest in the cornerstone of the \$175,000 brick building as long as it stands. They will include an edition of The Birmingham Eccentric, 1926 Birmingham Directory, a history of Martha Baldwin and of the library, and various other mementos, all of which will be announced to the audience at the luncheon on Saturday afternoon.

still working on the Peabody house. A hose line was connected and the engine went to the home of George Warner, 524 Purdy street, where a box of explosives had caught fire in the basement. This was soon extinguished and the engine returned to the Willets house where the blast soon was under control.

The department was called to extinguish a grass fire near the Grand Trunk tracks and Oakland avenue earlier in the morning. The fire was under control in a few minutes. Authorities attribute its cause to sparks from an engine.

A grass fire Monday afternoon caught fire to Brookside drive and the Grand Trunk tracks. In the opinion of firemen a spark from a train engine caused the blaze. No damage was done.

Three fires Wednesday afternoon were extinguished by firemen before damage was done. A fire on a grass fire near the Grand Trunk tracks and Oakland avenue threatened considerable property but was brought under control after an effort on the part of the firemen. A rubbish fire in the rear of the Woodward block, Woodward avenue south of Maple avenue, called out the department at 1:15 p. m. and shortly after 2 p. m. the department was called to Oak street because of another grass fire.
