## AGED RESIDENT TAKEN BY DEATH

Charles E. Mudge Dies On Eve Of 74th Birthday Here

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 4 p. m. for Charles E. Mudge, one of Birmingham's oldest residents. Mr. Mudge, who died Saturday of complications incident to old age, had lived in his house at 133 east Maple avenue for 40 years. He had been ailing for several years, but since the death of his son, Earl A. Mudge, exactly five months prior to his own demise, his health had failed rapidly.

Mr. Mudge was born in Andover, N. Y. He would have been 74 years old the day following his death.

Rev. Floyd Emerson Logee, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiated at the service at the home. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery. Mr. Mudge is survived by his widow, Mrs. Flora Mudge.
