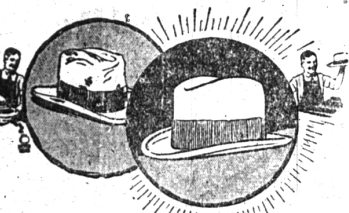

SPEAKER TRACES PROGRESS OF GAS

Large Attendance Of Exchanges Hear Pontiac Man In Talk

A nearly 100 per cent attendance of the Birmingham Exchange club was attained Tuesday afternoon at the Woodward Inn, Royal Oak, when E. H. Luther, of the Consumers Power company, gave a resume of the history of gas and manufacture of gas in England when, in 1812, a company was formed in London and began the exploitation of the advantages of gas. First experiments were made in 1669, but it was not until 1708, Murdoch, an inventor in Scotland, designed a plant to extract gas from bituminous coal, and in 1816 the first American gas company was started in Baltimore, Maryland, he said. Many hardships were encountered in getting the general public to accept the use of gas, but Luther, and in this respect he paid tribute to the stove manufacturers in assisting to educate the public. The Barlow family of Detroit and Bloomfield Hills were pioneers in gas stove manufacturing.

More than half of a gas company's investment lies in its distributing system, the speaker continued. Beneath the streets of Birmingham there are 25 miles of gas mains, he pointed out. Mr. Luther extended a cordial welcome to the exchanges and others to visit the gas plant in Pontiac and witness the actual manufacture of the gas that is used in Oakland County.

YOUNG MOTORISTS TO APPEAR IN COURT

Question Of Age Reduces Seriousness Of Charge Against Alleged Motor Thieves

The trial of John Fower, of Alpena, and Marshall Anderson, of Ferndale, charged with driving away a stolen car, was taken out of the jurisdiction of the circuit court and into the juvenile court when Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Norman C. Org found that the boys were 15 and 16 respectively instead of 17 and 18 as they had said.

They were arraigned in Judge Floyd S. Buck's justice court April 6. On failure to furnish \$2,000 bond, they were jailed and their trial was set for April 8. At a meeting in Prosecuting Attorney Clark D. Underwood's office, however, it was reported that the boys were not of age.

The boys are said to have driven away a car belonging to Roy Monery, Forest street, who trail them to the Thirteenth Mile and Southfield roads, where he claimed he seized his car, brought the pair back to Birmingham and turned them over to the police.

WHO'S WHO and TIMELY VIEWS

ELIMINATION OF SHORT SESSIONS FORECAST AS CAMPAIGN ISSUE

United States Congressman from Kansas

(William A. Ayres was born at Philadelphia, Ill., on April 10, 1867. He was admitted to the Kansas bar in 1893. Ayres served as clerk of the court of appeals of the state from 1897 to 1901. Later, in 1907, he became prosecuting attorney of Sedgewick county, Kans. In 1915 he entered Congress for the first of his six terms. Congressman Ayres is a Democrat from Kansas, representing the Eighth Congressional District of Kansas, nominally a Republican stronghold.)

Elimination of "lame duck" sessions of congress with the opportunity they afford for ruthless destruction of filibusters by minorities bent on blocking important legislation, in my opinion will be pressed by the Democratic party as a major issue when Congress convenes in December. The country is disgusted with such performances.

The spectacle of a few senators—filibustering the will of the majority of veterans and widows dependent on congress for relief, pending on pensions, embracing administration of important government departments, designing public improvements essential to efficient and economical operation of the state of the Union, for the purpose of protecting against corruption from further exposure, calls for action. Such practices have put congress and our legislative procedure in disrepute before the country, even though I feel sure the great majority of senators and house members are in sympathy with the filibuster, but were powerless to protect themselves.

There is one way to prevent recurrence of such filibusters. It is to mark the close of the recent session and render important legislation a matter of life and death. That is to do away with the short session, when the time clock, and that alone, gives power to a handful to impose their will upon the great majority and our entire legislative system for deserved contempt. This can be achieved through constitutional amendment, which has been proposed in the Norris-Whit resolution.

Writing Paper Has Regal Introduction

THE RARE GIFT
Eighteen hundred years ago when the Chinese Emperor H. Ti desired the favor of Trajan, Emperor of Rome, he sent him a thousand sheets of writing paper, the rarest gift that an emperor could offer at that time.

In a quaint old Parish Church at London is shown a sheet of the first writing paper made in England, fourteen centuries later at the command of Queen Elizabeth. Desiring a stationery in keeping with the dignity of her court, she ordered her jeweler, John Skillman, to produce a type of paper worthy of the Royal signature.

Modern, John Skillman was immediately knighted by the Queen. Four hundred years later, to meet the requirements of the rapidly growing New England colonies, experts from English mills were brought to this country to reproduce economically by modern methods identical paper so highly esteemed and expensive at this time.

This marks the introduction of the writing papers in America.

DETROIT MAN HURT WHILE FIXING TIRE

William Row, 5274 Common street, Detroit, was seriously cut about the head Saturday night in an auto accident on Woodward avenue, about three miles south of Birmingham.

According to Birmingham police, Row and Herbert Farrington, also of Detroit, were heading a punctured tire when a car driven by Otto F. Harsh of Campbell road, Perley, crashed into the rear of their machine. Row was knocked down, his head being cut when it struck the pavement. Harsh and Farrington escaped without injury.

The injured man was taken to the Birmingham police department, where his injuries were attended by a surgeon. Later he was removed to his home.

SAFETY LINES LAID ON STREET

An experiment with a new kind of paint for laying lines temporarily held up traffic at Woodward and Maple avenues Monday afternoon.

The striking yellow lines now at the intersection were put on with a lacquer paint, said to dry in five minutes and to wear two months by the representatives of the Pearce-Gallagher Paint company of Highland Park, who furnished the paint to the police department gratis on trial.

The chief trouble with the paint was that it dried so slowly. It becomes badly tracked. That is why we are trying the new kind. Yellow was chosen because it is more striking than white.

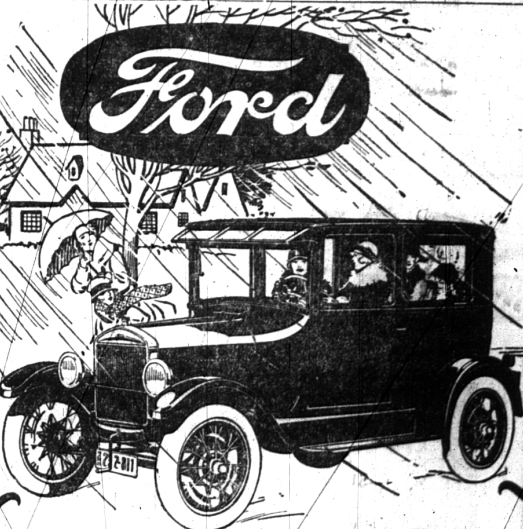
