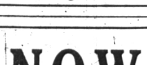

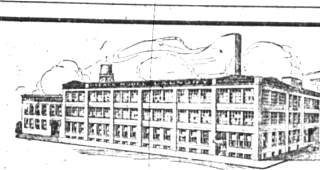

Ten men from Oakland County have applied so far for entrance to the summer camp of the Citizens Military Corps, according to announcement made by the war department.

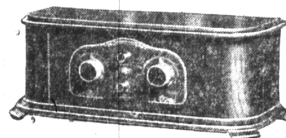
The men and the committee with Camp Mack's train this season were members of the squad in 1922.

REGISTRATION NOTICE

Saturday, Apr. 30, 1927

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that in conformity with Act 126, Public Acts of 1917, I, the undersigned Village Clerk, will upon any day except Sunday and a legal holiday, or the day of any regular or special election or official primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Village not already registered, who may apply to me personally for such registration, except that I can receive no names for registration on the day of the meeting of the Board of Registration.

Notice is further hereby given that the Board of Registration for Precinct 1, will meet at the Voting Booth at the Corner of Harmon Avenue and North Woodward Avenue, and the Board for Precinct 2 will meet in the Commission Room in the Village Hall, Corner Martin and Pierce Sts., and Precinct 3 will meet at Corner Lincoln and Woodward Avenues, on Saturday, April 30, 1927, from 8:00 o'clock A. M. to 9:30 o'clock P. M. (Eastern Standard Time) of said day for the purpose of completing the list of qualified electors of said Village.

Precinct 1, is all that territory North of the Center Line of Maple Avenue.

Precinct 2, is all that territory South of the Center line of Maple Avenue and North of the Center Line of Lincoln Avenue.

Precinct 3, is all that territory South of the Center Line of Lincoln Avenue.

The name of no person but an actual resident of said Village at the time of registration, and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote on the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH

If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, and shall UNDER OATH, state that he or she is a resident of said Village TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he or she possesses other qualifications of an elector under the Constitution; and that owing to sickness or bodily infirmity of himself, or some other member of his family, or owing to his absence from the Village on public business or his own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registration of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he shall then be permitted to vote at such election. If such applicant shall, in said matter, wilfully make any false statement, he shall be deemed guilty of perjury and, upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.

WOMEN ELECTORS

The names of all qualified women electors not already appearing on the registration list will be registered provided personal application is made in conformity with the foregoing provisions.
