The run of the book and now the run of the play has extended from the Atlantic as far west as the Pacific coast, so "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" is well known the country over to book lovers and playgoers alike. It was first produced in Detroit last Spring, before going into Chicago for a run and holds the record for consecutive days of dramatic attraction playing Detroit. And it is declared, further, that the almost inspiring cleverness, a kind of intuition coupled with undeniable knowledge, has given a synthetic blend to the characters of the book and the players provided, to bring them out of the amusing leaves into pulsing life of actual impersonations.

Successful runs in Chicago, New York, and along the Pacific coast have brought "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" well to the fore among the plays to see, and so one may expect that the Detroit performances will be rewarded by large attendance.

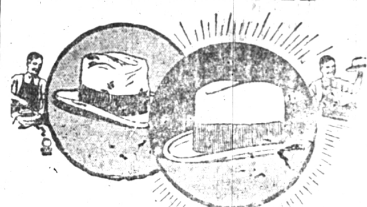

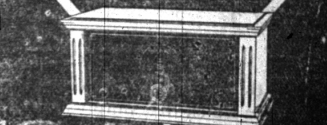

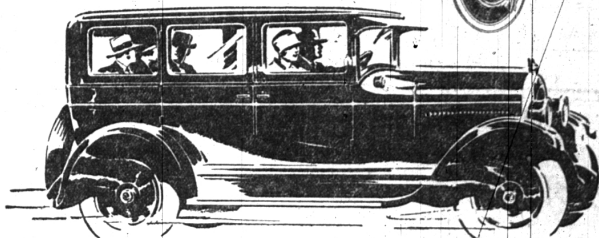
