

## PONTIAC PASTOR TO LEAVE POST

Dr. Bartlett, Congregationalist Head, Tenders Resignation

Pontiac, April 5.—Rev. Eugene Bartlett, for five years pastor of First Congregational Church, announced his resignation to parishioners last week. He will enter the evangelical field. The resignation is to take effect June 1.

Dr. Bartlett said he feels the church is ready to make another stride forward and that this can best be done under the "enthusiastic challenge of a new leader." The urge for evangelism has been growing upon him, Dr. Bartlett said, and he believes the time has come for him to enter churches of different creeds to further cooperation and kindness that shall later make for unity.

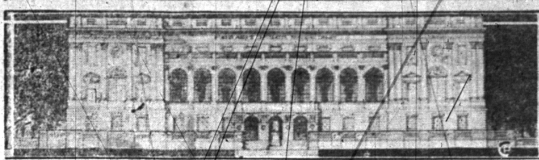

## BEES INSURE FRUIT IN STATE ORCHARDS

East Lansing, April 5.—Many of the best varieties of fruit which are grown in Michigan will not produce profitable crops unless provision is made for cross-pollination. H. D. Hoffman, M. S. C. specialist in horticulture, believes that the simplest way of insuring the cross-pollination is to place hives of bees in the orchards at blossoming time.

Some of the popular fruits which need pollen from other varieties are: Northern Spy and Rhode Island Greening apples; Bartlett and Kieffer pears; the J. H. Hale peach, and Windsor sweet cherries. Pollen from blossoms of the Rose and Flaming Beauty pears, Jonathan and Wexley apples, Hanner and Elberta peaches, and Dymond sweet cherries will fertilize the blossoms on the self-sterile varieties.
