Theaters

GARRICK

With the 130th Detroit performance celebrated last Thursday (Aug. 11) "Broadway" continues its rapid pace at the Garrick Theater and Sunday night marks the beginning of the eighteenth week of the engagement in Detroit, a record that has only been passed once in local theatrical history. The fascination of this play of the New York night clubs is astonishing. Patrons are drawn back again and again to see the hectic doings at the Paradise Night Club which is the scene of the drama. "Broadway" has more laughs than a hyena and more thrills than were ever packed into a melodrama. And furthermore it has the music and girls to attract the musical comedy fans. It is quick, obvious, and glorifies its own theatricalism, rushing madly but, expertly, to its climax. "Broadway" has brought back to the theater the audiences who stand at the conclusion of the play and applaud.

To quote one patron: "Broadway" is nothing but funny, human and dramatic speeches and situations. In many years of theater-going, I have never seen a play technically so perfect. So much so, that there is no technique apparent, which is, I believe, the highest form of technique. There is not a forced entrance or exit, not a stilted speech in the three acts. I do not suppose that intellectually it stacks up so well along with those of Ibsen, Kautsky or our friend, Will S. NEW DETROIT

Mr. Lasky commissioned Lawrence Stallings to write a story around the ship that never lost a battle and established a proud tradition for the American Navy. With characteristic thoroughness Mr. Stallings set about his research work and uncovered the drama from the early life of the old frigate that now lies rotting in the Navy Yard at Boston.

Mr. Lasky entrusted to James Cruze the production of the picture which was no greater than "The Covered Wagon." Mr. Cruze chose Wallace Beery for the important part of the boatwain and George Bancroft for the role of the chief gunner. To Esther Ralston was entrusted the part of the girl and Charlie Farrell was borrowed from Fox to play opposite her.

It was necessary to build a whole small Navy for the filming of the picture and "Old Ironsides" was reproduced from the original specifications into a modern-seaworthy ship. After a year of production work and the expenditure of more than a million dollars the picture was completed, and those who have seen it say that Mr. Cruze has not only exceeded his previous efforts but also has produced a screen drama which does justice to his great theme.

The most truthful editor has been found, W. R. 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BUILDING CODE—Ordinance No. 12

(Continued From Preceding Page)

- Section 2.—SCHEDULE OF FEES.
- (a) For alteration of or additions to existing installations 1.00
 - (b) For installations of not more than 25 outlets 1.00
 - (c) For each additional 10 outlets or less over 25 .25
 - (d) For each arc light .25
 - (e) For power installations of one K.W. or less .50
 - (f) For power installations of more than 1 and not more than 5 K.W. 1.00
 - (g) For power installations of more than 5 and not more than 10 K.W. 1.50
 - (h) For each K.W. over 10 .05
- Provided, however, that a minimum charge of \$1.00 shall be made for each permit.

ARTICLE V.—INSPECTION

Section 1.—APPLICATION FOR INSPECTION.
(a) Application for inspection must be made on the day before such inspection is wanted and before any part of the work is covered up so that it is inaccessible to the inspector.
(b) The electrical inspector shall inspect the work within eight (8) working hours after such application is made and shall issue a certificate of inspection for all work found in satisfactory condition.
(c) All work not approved by the inspector shall be put in satisfactory condition without delay and shall be re-inspected before any certificate of inspection is issued.

Section 2.—RE-INSPECTION

(a) When re-inspection of faulty work is required or where a partial inspection is made for the purpose of permitting a part of the work to be covered up before completion of the entire job the person, firm or corporation requiring such re-inspection or requesting such partial inspection shall pay an additional inspection fee of one (\$1.00) dollar for each such additional inspection required or requested.

ARTICLE VI.—RULES AND REGULATIONS

Section 1.—GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

(a) All electrical installations in the Village of Bloomfield Hills shall be in accordance with the latest edition of the National Electrical Code, and no installation of electrical equipment shall be made except in conformity thereto.

(b) Wiring for all electrical installations in District No. 1, as defined by Section 1, Article 3, Part One, shall be run in conduit, and no system of open wiring shall be used.

PART FOUR—General Provisions

Section 1.—FAILURE TO DETECT VIOLATIONS

(a) The failure of any inspector to detect or discover any violation of this ordinance, or any faulty or inadequate work, before acceptance of the work in question shall in no case operate to relieve the person, firm or corporation doing such work for responsibility therefor or liability for same under the provisions of this ordinance.

(b) All such violations, or faulty or inadequate work shall at once be remedied and made to comply with all provisions of this ordinance at any time that they may be discovered or brought to light.

Section 2.—LEGALITY OF ORDINANCE

(a) Any portion of this ordinance be declared illegal or unconstitutional, such finding shall not invalidate the remainder of this ordinance.

Section 3.—APPEAL

(a) All official acts and decisions of the several inspectors are made subject to the approval of the Village Commission, who shall pass upon any such act or decision in the event of any dispute.

(b) Any person feeling aggrieved by any such act or decision may appeal to the Commission of the Village of Bloomfield Hills, provided that, pending the action of the Commission upon such appeal, the authority and decision of the inspector shall be final and conclusive in the enforcement of all provisions of this ordinance.

Section 4.—PENALTY

(a) Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, or who shall fail, neglect or refuse to comply with any order herein authorized to be issued, shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment for not to exceed sixty (60) days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court imposing such penalty.

(b) Any licensed plumber, or electrician who shall become subject to penalty as provided in paragraph (a) of this section, shall in addition to such penalty have his license suspended or revoked, and shall thereby be debarred from obtaining permits or doing work in the Village of Bloomfield Hills for such length of time as the Commission of said Village shall deem just and proper.

(c) The violation of one or more of the provisions of this ordinance shall be considered as a separate offense for each and every provision so violated.

Section 5.—DATE EFFECTIVE

August 22, 1927.

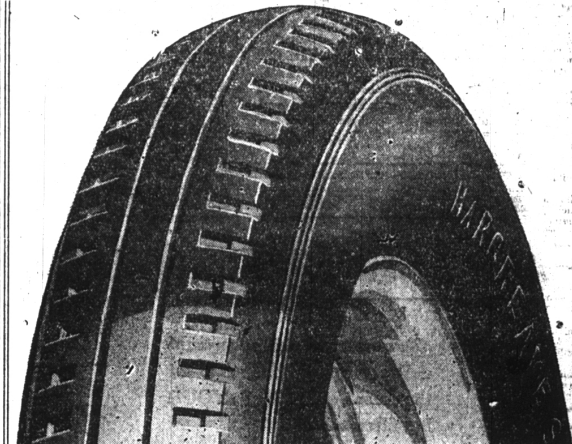
