Club Entertainer Has Long Career On The Radio

Entertainment was furnished the Rotary and Exchange clubs at their luncheon meetings, on Monday and Tuesday, respectively, by Mr. Clyde Sullivan, known as "Harmonica Mike," by his radio friends, and as a club entertainer throughout the United States.

The title of the oldest radio broadcaster is claimed by Mr. Sullivan, who lives at Birmingham, Ala. He has been a musician on the air since 1914, when he broadcast for experimental stations, and was one of the entertainers to broadcast at WJZ, New York, the first station to give a radio program in the United States. He also played over the first English station, 2LO, the British Daily Tribune.

Mr. Sullivan's harmonica concerts have been heard from 375 radio stations in the United States, besides his numerous programs at clubs in many cities. Since Jan. 6, Mr. Sullivan told the Rotarian and Exchange club members, he has played before 14 Rotary, 10 Kiwanis, 16 Lion, and 5 Optimist clubs throughout the country. Mr. Sullivan has spent 27 years as an entertainer, and plans to tour the European broadcasting stations next year.

As "Harmonica Mike," the title by which he is known to thousands of radio fans, Mr. Sullivan played from WJZ, the Detroit Press station, Tuesday. Several clubs in this section are included in Mr. Sullivan's schedule while in Michigan.


Many selections both popular and classical were played on various types of mouth organs before Rotary and Exchange club members by Mr. Sullivan.

Conner had no valid license, McWain stated that the truck had been traveling a wavering course before he attempted to pass it.

The defendant admitted leaving the scene where the accident happened but claimed he was not responsible for it. He said he thought no damage had been done.
