### SUGGESTIONS

**Baked Cooky Frosting**—Mix a tablespoon of soft butter and one of grated chocolate or cocoa and enough sugar to make mixture crumbly. Sprinkle over the rolled cookie dough and roll very lightly. Then cut out cookies as usual.

For variety, use the butter and sugar, a very little flour and a few drops of vanilla the same way.

**Use Magnifying Glass**—It is sometimes hard to tell just what the figures are in the fractional numbers given in newspaper recipes so keep a small magnifying glass with recipe book and it only takes an instant to be sure whether it is one-third or one-eighth, and it would make quite a difference in the result if one guessed wrong.

## FRUITS PROVIDE SUMMER DISHES

Simple fruit desserts are decidedly to be preferred for hot weather meals. For these odd days when strawberries, raspberries and melons are either poor in quality or too high in price, the following recipes are recommended for their economy and for their use of always available fruit.

**Mixed Fruit Dessert**—Dates, 1/2 grapefruit, 3 maraschino cherries, 2 slices pineapple.

Stone and quarter the dates, remove fibrous membrane from grapefruit and cut in pieces. Cut pineapple in pieces and mix all together. Serve in sherbet glasses.

**Apricot and Almond Cake**—1/2 cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups flour, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 3 teaspoonful baking powder.

Mix as for any butter cake and bake in two layers. Put together with following mixture: Wash one pound dried apricots, thoroughly cover with water and let soak overnight. In morning add one cup sugar and cook very slowly until thick. Add more sugar if too tart and 1/4 cup shelled and blanched almonds. Cook two or three minutes longer, then cool and spread between cakes.

**Pear Pastries**—One cup chopped pears, 1/4 cup pear syrup, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon chopped preserved ginger, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 tablespoon flour, 1/2 tablespoon butter.

Mix sugar and flour, then add other ingredients, heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Remove from fire. Line individual pie tins with pastry and fill with mixture. Put strips of pastry lattice fashion across the top and bake until brown in very hot oven.

**Prune Bread Pudding**—Two cups rich milk, 1 cup stale bread crumbs, 1 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon melted butter, 3 egg yolks, 3 egg whites, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, prunes.

Add crumbs to milk. Beat yolks

until very light, add melted butter, salt and nutmeg. Mix with crumbs and milk, pour into buttered pan and bake in a moderate oven until pudding is set. Spread canned or cooked prunes over top, sprinkle with sugar. Place under broiler until sugar is melted and somewhat browned, then cover with meringue made from stiffly beaten whites. Cook in slow oven until meringue is delicately browned—about 20 minutes.

### OAK HILL POTATOES

(Mrs. Mary Morton's Tested Recipe.)

Four cold boiled potatoes, six hard boiled eggs, salt and pepper. Two cups of thin white sauce made as follows: Melt four tablespoons butter, add three tablespoons flour, salt and pepper to taste, two cups milk. Cool until thick, add to potatoes and eggs cut in dice, put into a buttered baking dish, sprinkle bread crumbs and a little grated cheese—if you like it—on top, and brown in oven—about fifteen minutes.

Spanish Rice—One cup rice, one

cup finely chopped onion, one cup

tomatoes, one Spanish sweet pepper, three to four cups water or

bouillon, one tablespoon sugar, one tablespoon butter. Cook the

rice in boiling water or bouillon for fifteen minutes. Melt the butter in a pan and add chopped onion

and pepper. Cook until light brown, then add tomatoes and sugar. Drain rice and add to the

other mixture. Flare rice in a moderate oven for one-half to three-quarters of an hour. Cheese may be

grated over the top to add flavor, or left over meat may be added to the dish.

**Peach Pie**—Line the pie tin with your favorite pie crust and fill with sliced peaches. Beat an egg well and then add a cup of sugar slowly. Pour this over the

peaches. Put on upper crust and bake as usual.

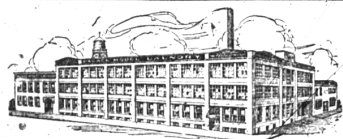
