WORK IS SOON TO START ON NEW SCHOOL

Board Decided To Call Institution The "Quarton"; Changes Made

PLANS ARE APPROVED

Final approval of the plans for the grade school at Chatterfield and Oak streets is expected to be given at the next meeting of the school board, Tuesday evening, Sept. 6, and bids on the work will be called for immediately afterwards, according to Frederick D. Madison, the architect. Actual work on the excavating will begin about Oct. 1, Mr. Madison said. The school is to be named "Quarton," he decided on the name.

Mr. Madison took the plans to the school board yesterday for approval of the state department of public instruction, after the school board had added suggestions and given a general approval to the plans Monday night. A rough plan of the building had been seen before by the board, but Monday night was the first time members had seen the actual architectural drawing in all their details.

"Quarton" Decided Upon
It was called the "Quarton" school, because of its location in the Quanton Lake Estate, near Quanton road and Quanton Lake.

Details of the new building were discussed at a free test meeting suggested by the members of the board, but in the main, the plans of the building have been approved. The building will be a two-story brick building, with a light, face brick with a slate roof of the Mansfield variety, topped by a copper capitol. Mr. Madison estimated 300,000 bricks.
