SPECIAL NOTE CITIZEN PLAN IS OPPOSED

Commission Decides Against Special Election; May Be Brought Up Later

STATUS IS UNCHANGED

Although the village commission voted unanimously against holding a special election on the question of adopting the city form of government here, the matter remains today practically where it was before the passage of the resolution. Because of the unanimous vote, any member of the commission may at any time bring the matter up for consideration. It was pointed out by H. T. Ellerby, president of the commission, that a resolution against the special election was presented by Commissioner Lawrence H. Fuller. That it is mandatory for the issue to appear on the ballot in the event of a special election before the regular elections in March is indicated.

In explaining his resolution, Mr. Albert said he felt the voters of Birmingham would not have enough time to study the situation before a special election. Mr. Ellerby agreed to support Mr. Albert's resolution if an agreement could be reached for the insertion of the issue on the ballot if a special election were held before the regular election date. The amendment was voted down as was a resolution of Mr. Ellerby's which called for the tabling of the matter. The former was defeated four to three while the latter was approved by all members of the board except the president.

Mr. Ellerby explained the strategy of his vote for Mr. Albert's resolution, pointing to the charter which provides that any citizen who registers one of a unanimous vote may bring the matter up again for consideration. Mr. Ellerby explained he was not insistent upon a special election, but that the obligation of the village is to pay the \$150,000 on the tax for building the new school building.
