

ROAD MEN AWAIT WINTER

Township Highway Equipment Tuned For Heavy Work With Snow

Work on the highways in Bloomfield Township is being speeded up today in preparation for the extreme winter weather, forecast for an early date, according to John Wilson, highway supervisor.

The concrete pavement on South boulevard running from Woodward avenue to the new Yellow Coach & Truck plant is open to traffic today.

The North and South Cranbrook roads are expected to be opened sometime next week, Mr. Wilson says. These are of gravel.

Equipment used in clearing the highways of heavy snows is being put in tune today for early use and some minor repairs are being made so the road workers will be ready to start the work of clearing off the snows when they are needed, said Mr. Wilson.

LAWSON URGES CO-OPERATION

Representative Says Women Could Aid In Law Enforcement

Michigan laws are designed with regard for women and it is up to the women to see that they do their share in urging the enforcement of those laws.

This is the gist of the talk given to members of the Civic League at their meeting last week by John C. Lawson, state representative from this district of Oakland County.

A round table discussion of the subject Mr. Lawson talked on will be held by members of the club at their meeting Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. in the Community House according to plans today. Mrs. Otto Beier will lead the discussion.

Mr. Lawson was introduced by Mrs. Beier, chairman of the day, and spoke on "The Legal Standing of Women in this State, as Compared With Other States," tracing the history of laws from the old English, or common law to the present.

Women On State Boards

"This state has recognized its need of women's thought and influence in its affairs and has made it possible, and in some cases, obligatory, for women to be members of many state boards," said the speaker, pointing to the benefit this has been to women, especially in regulating working hours and conditions for women in gainful occupations, which has been brought about since women have had representation on the State Labor Board.

Contrary to the conditions in some other states, Michigan women may serve as jurors.

In civil suits the state law favors the woman over the man in that she may not be imprisoned, but the man may be. However, in criminal prosecutions both men and women may be incarcerated.

The probate law gives advantage to women in the matter of real estate rights, giving her preference in the administration of the husband's estate, and in the matter of guardianship for young children the league was told. A father cannot win away the custody of a child from its mother, as can be done in some states he added.

Must Support Children

"Michigan's law insists that a father support his children. Even illegitimate children are protected and given the support of the father, the statute insisting that the father bear the burden of support with the mother."

"Absolute control over her belongings and real estate, and the right to hold real estate in her own name, as well as jointly with her husband, has been given a married woman as well as single women."

"Whereas in some states a husband may collect, hold and expend the earnings of his wife, in Michigan for over 16 years the law has given married women the right to have, hold and enjoy all her earnings the same as though she were unmarried."

"A single act of infidelity is sufficient grounds for a divorce in the case of either a man or woman. This provision statute is a fair, and creates a better condition than the laws of some other states."
