## Final Grid Game Ends In Tie For Baldwin

One of the most thrilling football contests ever played by high schools in this section, witnessed by a record crowd of over 2,000, was waged between Birmingham and Royal Oak last Thursday at Baldwin in their ninth annual Thanksgiving Day meeting. Birmingham pulled a surprise in the

to place kick the point after the game, but the kick was blocked. The score was a tie in Birmingham's favor. Following this episode, Birmingham's defense and the Maroon team continued its playing attack with Cox completing three passes to the main line. Royal Oak left half, Roy, crossed the line and kicked the point.

**Baldwinites Get R. O. Coat Though Score Is a Tie**

Although unable to win from Royal Oak Thursday, Birmingham had "Royal Oak's coat" Wednesday night. The unfortunate Billy, procured from some farm and draped with Royal Oak's colors, was led forcibly in the pep meeting by the Baldwin High School students. Blared at by the band and by auto horns, it required the services of two lanky attendants to keep him in the "path of duty."

On Morrison's kickoff for Royal Oak, Halback Doherty staged a clear field before he was downed. Birmingham was unable to complete its pass out of eight attempts. One was intercepted. In contrast, Cox hurled Birmingham passes to open receivers with great success. Four passes out of eight were completed with 80 yards, with one being intercepted. Royal Oak showed an advantage over the Maroon eleven by staging seven first downs to Birmingham's four. Although not reversing the chain's length as many times as the local team, the Baldwin men stepped up to gain 144 yards to Royal Oak's 117. The Acorn's yardage was considerable, due to penalties totaling 25 yards and losses from scrimmage amounting to 34. Birmingham lost 10 on penalties and eight during play. Royal Oak showed considerable strength in its line play, rushing the ball for 65 yards while Coach Johnson's men backed the wall for 60. Birmingham's end runs were amazing by week, only 13 yards being gained in this fashion, while Royal Oak went the opposite way, rushing the line for 52 yards. The great advantage of the Maroon and White was on passing.

**Even In First Half**  
In the first half the rival eleven were quite evenly matched, although Royal Oak gained four first downs to Birmingham's one. Once in each of the quarters Royal Oak secured the Birmingham goal line, but were repelled by a strong defense. The Acorn's advance was made mostly by Morrison outdistancing the punt of Herman Schwartz. A great part of each quarter was spent in Birmingham territory, although the local aggregation made no exceptional gains. Morrison was thrown several times during this period for large losses. Twice he was thrown for losses over 10 yards. One of the spectacular gains of the second quarter was Cox's 12 yard line rush, starting on his five yard line.

Both Captains, Morrison and Henry, took part the entire game and ended their high school grid careers. "Doc" featured practically all Royal Oak's creditable work. Henry, although giving a good account of himself was unable to play his generally stellar game because of several lack injuries which he had suffered in his appearance in the starting lineup were considered poor, but his condition improved and he was started by Coach Johnson, although he was unable to practice for the final match.

For the Blue and White, Crowe, Hallock and Crossman performed in the backfield, while in the line Strimatter and Salkinan were good.

Birmingham's forward wall displayed more strength on the whole in this scrap, than ever before. Those showing up commendably are Elmer Root, Arthur Otis and Ralph Schwartz. In the backfield Cox, Cooney, Deberry, Milton, Thomson, all shared some honor. H. Schwartz showed remarkable sense in calling signals and made very few mistakes.
