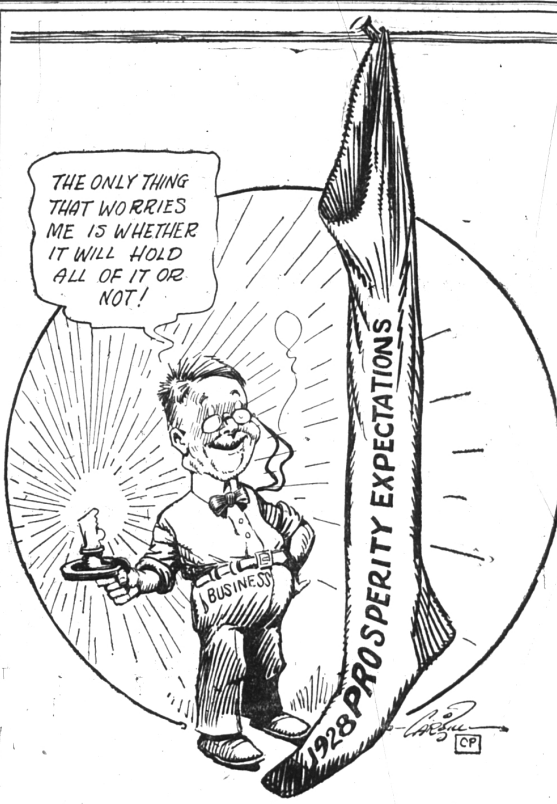

RETIRED MANUFACTURER BUILDS AFTER THE NEW, REVOLUTIONARY AUTO FEAST DAY

From California comes word of a revolutionary new six-cylinder automobile that has been designed by A. R. Demory, retired head of the Tinkert-Hobbs Auto Co., now residing in Santa Barbara, Calif.

According to the Los Angeles Times, Mr. Demory has built the first Ohio district, was elected senator for the term 1909 to 1915. Burton returned to the lower house in 1921, and has held a seat ever since. He has been a member of the Interparliamentary Union, and has participated, as such, in meetings at St. Louis, Copenhagen, The Hague, Vienna (Copenhagen and Bern).

We have reduced our standing army to less than 120,000—not more than one for every thousand of our population. In consonance with the Washington agreement we scrapped—that is, hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of warships, although we have the resources to build many which would have made many of the navies of the world look like a fishing fleet.

We do not wish to give a promise which shall be kept to the end and broken to the hope. We are unwilling to give our approval to proposals which neither we can approve nor do we think other nations will approve.

To speak the sentiment of America when I say that we desire equality among nations. We desire that the classification into "strong" and "weak" may be done away, and that all should be equal under the great law of justice. As our great Chief Justice Marshall said more than a hundred years ago, "With us Russia and Geneva have equal consideration."

I wish to say that while I do not deprecate the importance of propositions for disarmament, the crux of the matter is treaties for conciliation and methods for the peaceful settlement of controversies between nations. Until there is some machinery for the settlement of quarrels, until there is security, disarmament is impossible. Better far than limiting the salaried of cannon in a Locarno; for limiting armies and navies is a spirit of good-will and cooperation which shall prevail over the globe.

Like gracious drops of heaven-dew, shall spread its blessings all abroad."

constructed as to protect the fenders and wheels as well. The bumper which resembles a three-inch fire hose, are kept inflated at 150-pounds pressure through a compression tank mounted under the automobile. A pump attached to the rear springs, and working through the natural up-and-down action of the car, keeps the tank full of air at high pressure.

The tank also is connected with all four wheels, where air is carried through the spokes into the four tires, which thus are inflated to the required pressure at all times. A pop-off valve mounted on the present valve stem, is an assurance against over-inflation should the tires become overheated. A control, however, prohibits the entrance on over-pressure that is required.

Motor Heat Control. Mr. Demory has also invented an instrument which automatically turns off the motor when it approaches the danger point of overheating, after it has warned the driver by means of a buzzer when the motor is too hot. It is combined with a motorometer, mounted on the instrument board, which registers the motor heat in degrees.

On the rear of the automobile is a box which carries all the tools necessary for emergency repairs with the spare tire included from the dirt and safe from theft within. Mounted in the box is the tail head, which is a combination of a left turn, right turn, stop light and illuminated license plate which on the Demory automobile will be transparent. A similar light on the front of the automobile.

Inside the automobile are two cigarette boxes which will prevent fires from castaway cigarettes, Mr. Demory believes. The cigarette stub is placed in a small drawer, which, when closed, masticates and tears the stub into pieces, effectively putting out the burning embers, and then dropping them down a chute out of the automobile.

Louvers, removable, are placed in the windows of the automobile, if it is a closed car, and in front of the driver, which prevent the exclusion of the direct rays of the sun while admitting plenty of light.

Another innovation is a motor which will work on an automobile which will work on an engine mounted at the rear, with the transmission in front, although he does not plan to incorporate it in his present car. The automobile so constructed, he says, has long been the aim of the automotive industry, but none has been willing to spend the necessary large sum in developing it.

Mr. Ritterrath, who has been working on the automobile with Mr. Demory, is the inventor of cold light with the aid of which engine mounted at the rear, with the transmission in front, although he does not plan to incorporate it in his present car.

Vegetable Salad

Combine left-over cooked vegetables such as peas, beans and carrots with Cooked Salad Dressing. A few nuts and chopped celery may be added for variety. Pile lightly on lettuce or dress or put in a salad bowl and garnish with sliced hard-boiled eggs.

PICKLES AND RELISHES

Beet Preserves
