ASSAILANT FLEES**

Township Garage Worker Victim Of Mysterious Attack

Bloomfield Hills police today are trying to establish a motive for an attack Tuesday night upon Frank Williams, 24 years old, acting superintendent of the Bloomfield Township garage, by an unidentified negro. Williams was severely cut about the hands in the effort to defend himself against the would-be assailant.

According to the story Williams told police, he was working in the garage on the Long Lake road east of Woodward avenue at 10:30 p. m. when the man knocked on the door. As soon as Williams opened the door, the man attacked him with a large knife, he said. During the scuffle, the assailant did not utter a word and Williams said he was unable to understand the man.

The man fled in an automobile after he had cut Williams.

Always looking for something a bit "different" to serve, are we not? The menu for a day submitted may not be good for those who are on a reducing diet, but would taste good and may give you some ideas of varying the food you were planning to serve, if you cannot use the whole menu.

Today's Recipes
Spinach and Cheese in Ramekins—One cup of or one and one-half pounds spinach, one cup milk, one-half pound American cheese, one egg yolk, one and one-half lemons, one cup buttered crumbs, Heat milk in double boiler and add cheese and seasonings. Beat until smooth. Mix with cooked spinach and one-half of crumbs. Put mixture into hot buttered ramekins, sprinkle remaining crumbs over tops and lay small strips of bacon across before baking. Bake in moderate oven about fifteen minutes.

Almond Cookies—One-third cup butter, one-third cup sugar, one egg yolk, one and one-half lemons, one and one-half teaspoons baking powder sifted with flour. Mix in order given, roll out thin and cut into small cookies with the following on top of each: White of one egg, beaten, one-half cup confectioners' sugar, one-third cup almonds, chopped. Mix. Bake this one hour before mixing cookie dough.

Beet and Olive Dressing—Clean, chill and quarter one head of lettuce, using one quarter for each serving. To one-half cup of mayonnaise add two medium sized beets chopped into two (one) and four or five large olives chopped. Chill, spread dressing thickly over lettuce and serve.

Graham Gems for Two
(Mrs. Mary Morton's Daily Tested Recipe.)
One cup Graham flour, one cup milk, one-half teaspoon salt, one egg, one teaspoon baking powder, one teaspoon sugar. Mix dry ingredients together, add beaten egg and milk. Mix quickly and thoroughly. Flour into eight greased pans. Bake in hot water, seven to 25 minutes.

SAVORY SAUERKRAUT SALAD

These Recipes Will Answer the Question "What Shall I Have for Dinner?"

The practice of combining sauerkraut with other articles of food is a growing one. As a result we find these two salad recipes which are built on this popular cabbage product.

Sauerkraut Salad
Takes four cups sauerkraut, one dozen stuffed olives, two hard boiled eggs, six tablespoons salad oil or mayonnaise dressing prepared with lemon juice.

Place lettuce leaf on individual salad plates. Add portion of sauerkraut; use liberal amount of salad oil or mayonnaise. Halve the olives, slice the eggs and garnish. Ground salted peanuts may be added; and chopped ice will add crispness.

Sauerkraut Salad in Pimento Cups
Take four cups sauerkraut, one green pepper, one-half cup salted peanuts, six tablespoons salad oil, two tablespoons lemon juice, one tablespoon sugar, one-eighth teaspoon dry mustard, one-fourth teaspoon paprika and lettuce.

When measuring the sauerkraut add the liquid to the kraut. Cut the pepper into small pieces, or removal of seeds. Add the salted peanuts. Into a small bowl put the oil, lemon juice, sugar, dry mustard and paprika. Combine these ingredients with an egg beater. When thoroughly blended pour this dressing over the sauerkraut, pepper and peanuts, using a fork to combine the salad. Fill pimento cups with the salad, placing each cup on lettuce leaves. Serve individually. This recipe will serve six. Lacking the pimento cups serve the salad in nests of lettuce leaves.

RABBIT PIE
