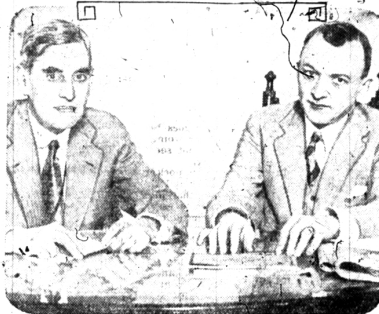

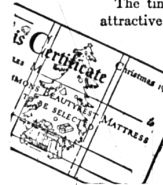

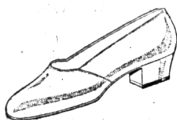

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE IS BUSY

Office Entails Considerably More Tasks As Birmingham Continues Growth

A call at least once at every home in Birmingham where there is a contagious disease is one of the duties of Mrs. Ralph Marson whose tasks as public health nurse have expanded rapidly since the start of the health department here a few months ago.

Working in conjunction with Dr. A. W. J. Newitt, head of the health department, and Miss Emma Christensen, school nurse, Mrs. Marson is kept in close touch with the amount of contagious disease in Birmingham so that immediate action may be taken if any signs of an epidemic manifest themselves.

When there is any question of contagion, Mrs. Marson immediately visits the home of the patient and recommendations are made. She often makes visits to the homes of school children who have been absent from school because of illness for any length of time if there may be taken if any signs of an epidemic manifest themselves.

This is one of the ways Birmingham is guarding against epidemics and it is given generally as the reason for the high rate of health in the village.

The days of Mrs. Marson are also kept busy with instruction work. She may be called at any time to aid mothers in the care of their children who are not yet of school age. She gives instruction when it is asked in pre-natal care and makes it a point to be available in her office in the village offices every afternoon from 2 until 4 for consultation.

AUTOMOBILES SKID ON ICE-COVERED ROAD

Sunday's rain and sleet caused many traffic tie-ups in Bloomfield Hills village, sent cars sliding about Woodward avenue and into the ditch, but no accidents of a serious nature were reported, according to William Putman, chief of police.

Sand was used on the hills so trucks could negotiate them and traffic throughout the day was compelled to travel at a slow rate of speed, the chief said. Several cars collided but none of the accidents was of enough importance to record, he said.

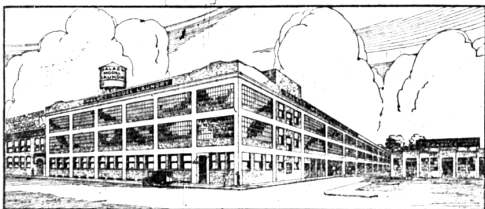
