APPROVE PLAN ON PROPOSED HOUSE CENTER

Architect's Sketch of Community House Given O. K. By Boards

SEEK COST ESTIMATE

Estimates of the cost of construction of the new proposed Community House are being made today by the architects, Muehlman & Farrar of Birmingham, following a discussion of plans at a meeting of the executive board of the architects Thursday night when the preliminary plans were accepted. The estimates are presented to the boards at another meeting scheduled for an early date, not yet definitely set.

Plans for the interior of the proposed building were shown Monday members Thursday by Fred D. Farrar of the firm. He also outlined the general idea of the exterior of the proposed building which has not yet been drawn. The structure is planned to occupy the northwest corner of Bates and Townsend streets, facing Bates street. The ground is owned by the house and it is 104x129 feet.

Plans for the building call for the accommodation of offices and club rooms for several of the village organizations. Two stories high, the structure will house on the first floor the office of the resident hostess, a woman's club room, a large dining room where the luncheon club will meet, a kitchen, a boy's playroom and an auditorium.

On the second floor will be the living quarters of the hostess, a girl's club room, a rest room, a kitchenette and offices for general welfare organizations. In the basement will be space for the thrift shop, run in conjunction with the Community House, and the employment bureau as well as club rooms for both the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

While it is expected that the building plans will have to undergo some changes before the start of construction, this outline, members of the board say, is substantial.

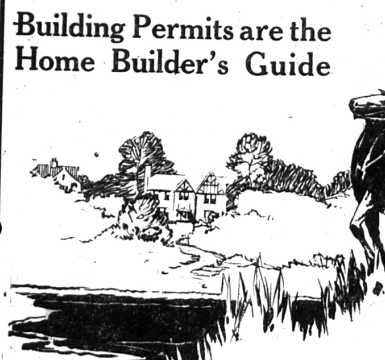

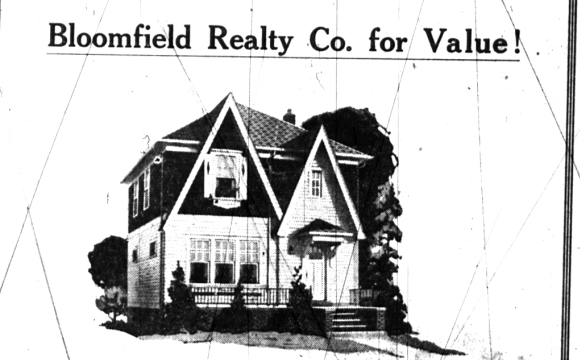
