CAGERS LOSE SEASON'S FIRST

Last Minute Rally Fails And Baldwin Bows To Northville, 22-20

EDITOR'S NOTE: School news on this page is gathered together and edited by students of Birmingham Schools. Most of the work is done by members of the journalism class of the Baldwin High School.

In the opening match of the season last Friday, the Baldwin basketball team lost by a narrow margin, to the Northville cagers. A last minute rally by the Maroon and White placed the score at 20-22, but several winning shots were missed. Lack of practice and playing experience was the main cause of the Baldwin's defeat.

Only three weeks of practice, for the villagers preceded the game. Chances to gain points on short shots at the cage were lost frequently and many markers on after fouls were missed.

Cox, McCradle Score High
Cox, center for Birmingham, and McCradle, who played opposite him, were the outstanding scorers of the Northville contest. Both totaled eight points, Cox by four baskets, and McCradle by three fingers and two points on fouls.

Two of McCradle's counters were looped through the hoop from mid-floor while Cox shot from close in, being open many times, but failing often to score on attempts.

Birmingham made nine throws, at the ring to Northville's eight, but the Northville quintet scored on the fouls to the visitor's two.

Brown, Maroon right guard, opened the scoring by sinking a

made one point from the foul line. Cox added two points, by a short shot and Schwarze, receiving the ball from Cox who tossed it from outside, finished the scoring. Cox missed on three attempts following this before the game ended, all were from points near the basket.

BOTH TEAMS SPRINT
In the seventh quarter both teams speeded up and the scoreboard showed Northville, 15-Birmingham, 11 at the half. A short throw for two points by LeFevre, local left forward, and a long shot by Watts, left guard, interrupted by many misses by both sides, started the additions to the score when the second quarter opened. Cox rotated and gave Birmingham the lead again by looping the hoop twice after having passes from Schwarze and Henry. Following this, Northville forged ahead to hold a lead which Birmingham could not overcome the remainder of the game. Ware, McCradle and Thompson, for Northville, and Cox for the visitors scored points to finish the half.

In the third period neither team seemed able to register their attempts for some time, until McCradle looped from close in and Thompson added a point from the foul line. Brown and Henry came back soon after and narrowed the margin by dropping a counter attempt.

In the final quarter after Thompson and Ware talked in shops for the home team, Birmingham started a rally which fell short of tying the score by one basket. Schwarze

Baldwin's Got Unanimous Decision In Meet With Ferndale Group

The debating team of Baldwin High School won their first home debate Friday afternoon when they defeated Mr. Crossen by a unanimous decision. The debate, which was held in the senior session room, was well attended by the student body, as the Mr. Crossen team defeated Birmingham in the elimination series last year.

The Birmingham team, composed of Norma Darton, Leland Gunn and Mildred Patterson, discussed the negative side of the question. Resolved, That the direct primary system of nomination for public officers in the United States shall be abolished.

Under the direction of H. Earl Corcoran, debate coach, the team has been training intensely for the meet. Experiments have been spent on the delivery of the speeches and work-out have been spent in the Detroit library in mastering the subject matter. Those who attended both debates admired the marred improvement of the team over the first debate which was held at Ferndale, three Nov. 18, with a 2-1 decision.

The next debate will be held Jan. 12, at Port Huron, with the Birmingham team having the affirmative side of the question. One other debate, on January 22, will complete the preliminary series of the season. The schools having the highest scores will enter the championship series with the two best teams meeting for the championship debate at Ann Arbor, April 27.
