CHRISTMAS MUSIC, SPEECHES FEATURE ROTARIAN PROGRAM

The singing of Christmas carols and the bringing of a Christmas message occupied the program at the Birmingham Rotary club meeting here Monday noon. A quartet composed of Rotarians Louis Haskall and Robert C. Beck, and Mrs. James L. Oliver and Mrs. W. Whiting Raymond, assisted by Edie Edwards at the piano, sang a number of carols in a splendid manner, following which Mr. Haskall sang "The Heavenly Song."

Rev. Robert Marquis Atkins, pastor of the First Methodist Church, and a former member of the Rotary club, brought the message of Christmas. His address emphasized the necessity of considering more the character of Jesus Christ at Christmas, and less that of Santa Claus.

"I have been reading advertisements, as well as official proclamations, made at Thanksgiving and Christmas for the past two or three years, and many of them never contain a word about Jesus or God," stated Rev. Atkins. "Of late years too much emphasis is placed on the commercial side of Christmas."

"The glory of Christmas is not in the village where Jesus was born; it is not in the songs, beautiful though they are, that have been written about Jesus Christ; it lies not in the Star of Bethlehem, it has no bearing on the parents of the Babe Jesus, or His ancestry; it has little to do with the Wise Men; it has little to do with the gifts that were brought in Jesus' day—but it has much to do with the Christ that was born to this earth nearly two thousand years ago.

"The marvel of Christmas today is that it is not the first Christmas, but that it exists nearly two thousand years after Jesus was born, and is being celebrated all over the world, and by such clubs as Rotary. No man in the history of the world has left such an imprint upon the affairs of the world as Jesus Christ who, in three short years, stood revealed as the true Son of God—who has given mankind a revelation of man's own relationship to God. Jesus, by His life and teaching, has shown man what heights he, too, can reach by the application of God's commandments.

"Our histories record the progress of the human race. We see at one time a movement completed to emancipate the slaves; to give women equal rights; to accept the values of personality in life, and we wage war for the preservation of democracy. But all the movements started on earth hold no promise to outlaw war, save the doctrine of Jesus Christ, and this we look today for peace on earth, good will toward men."

"Mankind will only come into his true inheritance by following the precepts of Jesus, and becoming Christlike," concluded Rev. Atkins.

PROBATE WILL OF CHAMPION

Estate Of Bloomfield Hill Manufacturer Is Over \$3,000,000

The will covering the \$3,000,000 estate of Albert Champion Bloomfield Hills, who died Oct. 28 while in France, was admitted to probate this week. The Detroit Trust company and Basil de Gaudichard of Flint were named executors. Mr. Champion was engaged in the manufacture of spark plugs. By the terms of the will the tire estate goes to the widow, Mr. Edna J. Champion of Bloomfield Hills. She had to survive her husband 30 days to become the beneficiary otherwise the will provided for a trust arrangement and half of the estate was to be held in trust for a brother and his children and half went to Basil de Gaudichard, who had been a lifelong friend of the deceased.

ELLERBY CITES ADVANTAGES FROM DETROIT METROPOLITAN PLAN

Birmingham has everything to gain and nothing to lose by being included in the Detroit metropolitan area.

This is the opinion of President H. T. Ellerby following a meeting in Detroit when officials of various communities in Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties approved the plan. The meeting was called with the idea of enlarging the metropolitan area of Detroit before the 1930 census is taken.

Because all the communities in the vicinity of Detroit are affected by that city and are in a position to gain by a good statistical showing, Mr. Ellerby favored the plan, he said.

He pointed out that Birmingham is largely dependent upon Detroit and said it was of mutual interest to both cities that the village be included, with others in the county in the metropolitan area.

Under the plan, the village will be affected in no direct way and will maintain its identity, he said.
