### OAKLAND COUNTY'S PART IN SEAL SALE DRIVE ON T.B. EXPLAINED

Figures released from the state headquarters tell today the part Oakland County played in the subscription to funds in the sale of seals to aid in the fight against tuberculosis.

Residents of the state of Michigan paid on an average of five cents each in 1926 to help fight tuberculosis and thus aid in the promotion of public health.

While the Christmas seal sale last year fell below that of 1925 in that way preventing the entire program of anti-tuberculosis work planned for 1927 from being carried out, it is hoped that enough money will be obtained from the seal sale this year to carry on an especially intensive campaign for the early diagnosis of tuberculosis, as well as continue the preventive work being done against the disease in this state.

Although the per capita average for the state as a whole was five cents, many counties fell below this figure. Washenaw county with a per capita sale of 10.45 cents ranked first in the state. The per capita sale in Oakland County was 5.11 cents.

Of Oakland County residents could visit the Tuberculosis sanitarium and actually see the number of cases and realize what the attack of the white plague means they would be anxious to contribute to the county Tuberculosis association's Christmas seal sale to aid in stamping out the disease in our county.

"The work of the Tuberculosis association aims principally at preventive measures, by means of diagnosis and early detection," continued Dr. Sutcliffe. "Much of this preventive work is centered upon the children of the county because we believe that if children showing any symptoms are taken in hand early they can be assured freedom from the disease when they are mature. We accomplish this by thorough examination. Our program as outlined for next year calls for the establishment of several new diagnostic chest clinics to aid in this work."

### SHERIFF EXPLAINS DOG QUARANTINE

Tells When Dogs May Be Allowed Freedom Without Muzzles

The conditions under which dog owners may allow their pets the freedom without muzzles is explained today by Sheriff Frank Schram who clears up misunderstandings which arose over a recent quarantine in the state.

In a recent article the state law which says that no dogs without muzzles shall be allowed to run at large was quoted. Sheriff Schram explains however that this is not strictly exact as dogs that have been vaccinated against rabies during the last year and bear a tag certifying such vaccination do not have to be muzzled or chained.

"All dogs that have been vaccinated any time during the last year will be allowed to run at large although they must wear a tag that has been given them by a qualified veterinarian and must at all times be on a collar with a dog collar, and all dogs which have not been vaccinated by a qualified veterinarian in the past year, the owner of such dogs must comply with the order of the State Veterinarian by keeping the dogs securely muzzled or chained or in some way whereby the dog will be kept on the premises of the owner."

"A great many people are under the impression that officers from this department will go out and deliberately shoot every dog they see running at large. This we are not going to do and I want every deputy sheriff of Oakland County to know that in cases where they might be called or they find a dog running at large first to find out whether the dog has been vaccinated. If there is no tag hanging to the dog's collar to show that he has been properly vaccinated then the officer must take the dog and keep him confined for at least 24 hours or until such time as he might be satisfied that the dog has no rabies. Then, if he thinks it is very proper for the dog to be disposed of in the proper way."

"Most fires never would occur if the proper precautions against hazards were taken ahead of time," the chief said. "It is the duty of the inspectors—all of whom are trained firemen to point out possible hazards in residences and commercial buildings and it is then the duty of the owners or occupants to see that the hazards are removed."

The men report that most of the visits made have revealed satisfactory conditions. They also say that almost invariably by the time they make the second visit to places which have been reported unsatisfactory, the hazards had been removed by the occupants.

Chief Olson reiterated his warning against Christmas tree fires. Candles should be avoided in every case where it is possible, he said.
