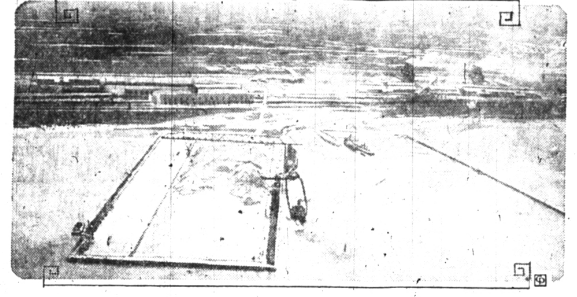
Firemen Prevent Spread Of Flames At D. U. R. House On Woodward

No one seems to have trouble finding the new place."

James W. Cobb, postmaster: "This past has been the busiest Christmas for the postoffice in the history of that institution in Birmingham. The business exceeded that of last year by 25 percent."
